Plastic jars are fine but do not donate glass jars, paper products or toiletries. The most needed food items are canned proteins (tuna, chicken, salmon), low sodium soup, cooking oil in plastic bottles, and peanut butter in plastic jars.

To give more than one bag of food, place the extra bag outside your front door with note that it is a donation to Scouting For Food.

Last year the Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Venture Crews in Arlington County collected and delivered over 52,000 pounds of food to AFAC. The food assistance center serves more than 2,000 families per week.

# Carlin Hall Students Release Monarch Butterfly For a Long Flight to Mexico

Carlin Hall Pre-School children gathered with their teacher, Carly Moser, to release the Monarch butterfly they had nurtured in their classroom through all its wondrous stages.

It arrived as a tiny black and white baby caterpillar chewing on a milkweed leaf.

With daily feedings of milkweed leaves, it shed its skin five times (each shedding is called an "instar" and allows the caterpillar to grow into its next stage), finally becoming a gorgeous striped green, bright yellow, black and white two-inch long adult.

The children checked on their caterpillar every day and waited impatiently during its two-week chrysalis stage. Finally, the chrysalis cracked open and the butterfly emerged, ready for them to take her outside and wish her well on her journey to Mexico!

Numbers of monarchs have decreased significantly over the last 20 years, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service says.

In the United States, there is a massive effort to provide habitat for monarch butterflies, imperiled bumble bees and other pollinators, the agency said.

Individuals can plant milkweed and nectar plants that are native to their areas, USFW said. They can also organically to minimize impacts on monarchs, their food plants and other pollinators.

# Author to Speak on WW II Women Code breakers in the DC Area

While their brothers, boyfriends, and husbands were taking up arms to go overseas in 1942, women went to the nation's capital equipped with sharpened pencils–and even sharper minds–to do highly demanding top secret work, involving complex math and linguistics.

Author Liza Mundy will tell their story Thursday,

Mundy's work focuses on the lives and labors of several code-


breakers while weaving their stories among the larger events of the war and their daily activities.

> Running early computers and poring over reams of encrypted enemy messages, they worked in makeshift buildings in Arlington and Washington, DC, from 1942 to 1945.

> Ordered never to reveal their war work, these women and their accomplishments were all but written out of history until the author discovered a cache of recently declassified documents at the archives of the National Security Agency.

> The program is free and open to the public. It is part of a monthly series of public programs sponsored by the Arlington Historical Society and the

#### The survey

The association distributed a survey with the October issue of *The Village View* asking residents what they think GCA's priorities should be.

Among the questions were:

- What topics or speakers would be good for the GCA meetings?
- Do you want more advocacy from GCA on issues affecting our community?
- What would make GCA more relevant to members of the community?

• How can GCA better communicate with the community?

The survey also asked residents whether they would be willing to become GCA officers, attend County or School Board meetings, head or volunteer for social events, and other activities.

"Be part of the conversation. Be part of our growth," GCA President Julie Lee urged in her President's Corner column. "We can benefit from the voices of experience and the breath of fresh ideas.

"There is no need to reinvent the wheel. However, with a little fine tuning your GCA will operate more efficiently and effectively," Lee said.

#### Group discussions

The association used its Oct. 2 meeting to discuss the questions and issues raised in the survey.

Participants broke in to small groups focused on social activities, communications, and advocacy.

Suggestions regarding social activities included:



- Having the association facilitate new connections within groups within the community, such as new mothers, and senior citizens.
- Provide a welcome kit for new Glencarlyn residents.

Among the communications issues raised were:

- How to get residents to look at the Glencarlyn website.
- How to get 'early warning' on issues of common concern.

Some suggestions on advocacy were:

- Establishing an advocacy team to track progress on important issues.
- More interchange and partnering with other neighborhood associations.

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#### There is no doubt that the largest challenge in today's housing market is a lack of housing inventory for sale. 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
