Help Set Neighborhood Conservation Priorities Through 2019

The Oct. 1 GCA meeting is your opportunity to help determine priorities for Neighborhood Conservation (NC) efforts through 2019. Please review the questionnaire included in this edition of the Village View and bring it with you to the October meeting for a more detailed discussion of Glencarlyn's Neighborhood Conservation Plan (NCP) and suggested projects we may want to pursue. If you can't attend the meeting, please submit the questionnaire using one of the methods explained at the top of the form.

Arlington County's Neighborhood Conservation Program has been in place since 1964 as a grass roots effort to engage residents in conserving and improving their communities by developing and updating Neighborhood Conservation Plans. These plans are the basis for requesting county funds for improvements such as sidewalks, curbs and gutters, streetlights, park renovations, beautification and streetlights. Over 50 Arlington neighborhoods participate in this program. Glencarlyn's current NCP can be viewed at Glencarlyn.org under the Neighborhood Conservation tab. It describes the community's history,

Arlington Schools Deal With Record Student Population Growth

The number of Arlington County public school students will continue rising for years, according to APS forecasts and the system is working to provide enough classroom seats and other necessities to meet the projected growth, school officials said.

The expected volume of students "is the thing that's virtually driving everything that we're doing in the school system," Reid Goldstein, chairman of the School Board said in a presentation at the Sept .10

In September 2017 the student population reached 26,941, "the highest number of students in the Arlington school system ever," Goldstein said.

As of the first day of school this year, the unofficial count was 27,522 students. The official numbers are set to be released Sept. 30. Current numbers represent a 50 percent growth in the county schools student population over 10 years, Goldstein said.

The expenses involved in running your association are increasing. In addition to the valuable programs and speakers offered

at our monthly meeting, your GCA holds a variety of events and celebrations such as the Fall Picnic, Halloween and Holiday parties, the Spring celebration, the Yard Sale and of course Glencarlyn Days.

The Village View, which arrives at your door 10 months out of the year, provides a wealth of information and is a neighborhood treasure.

Most of you prefer to receive a paper edition, and I would like to continue providing it. However, the cost of printing has increased to the point where it exceeds the revenue collected from our advertisers. To increase the number of advertisers would require increasing our Village View by 4 pages, which increases printing costs.......

When the County renovated and took over scheduling of Carlin Hall, GCA lost a source of revenue.

Our only revenue sources are dues, luminaria sales and the Glencarlyn Day pancake breakfast. However, most of the money raised at breakfast is used to cover costs of our expanded Glencarlyn Days celebration such as the potluck/block party, parade and moon bounce/ sno-cones.

To be blunt, we have been running a \$2,000/year deficit for the past few years, which we cannot continue to do.

Your executive committee is looking at ways to raise funds and tighten our belt.

I am asking you to please do your part and pay your \$15 dues. If you are not sure if you have already paid, you can contact Tim Aiken, our Treasurer, or contact me. Or you can pay twice. You will be credited for next year. Also, if you have any suggestions for fundraisers, please let me know. THANK YOU.

The Quest for Glencarlyn's Moses Ball Spring

The historic Moses Ball Spring is one of Glencarlyn's little-known and hidden places.

Of course, many Glencarlynites are familiar with the actual Carlin Springs. Those springs, located near Four Mile Run at the bottom of the S. 2nd Street trail into Glencarlyn Park, are so famous they named the road after them. And they have their very

own historical marker. In contrast, alas, Moses Ball Spring languishes in obscurity.

One hot summer morning, Jerry Martineau and I set out in search of the secret Moses Ball Spring spot. You would never know it, but Moses Ball Spring sits in a grassy hollow just below the main Virginia Hospital Center/Urgent Care building entrance. It takes a short walk from the pavement to reach it.

Our inquisitive rediscovery team was promptly accosted by a vigilant security man who wanted to know what these suspicious characters were up to. I wanted to argue that the spring is a public place, but Jerry calmed me before matters became heated. Our expedition 1 ended as we were gently but unceremoniously evicted from the property.

A week later, armed with permission from Virginia Hospital Center HQ, we mounted

Expedition 2. After an amicable chat with the security chief, we once again descended to the spring. Jerry had come armed with his camera gear to document the moment. I was armed with a shovel.

development, natural environment, cultural sites and infrastructure, along with the goals for conservation and improvement identified in a neighborhood-wide survey.

The plan was last updated in 2011, and GCA is requesting volunteers to determine how best to update it to reflect Glencarlyn's current concerns. If you are interested in helping with this effort, please indicate this at the bottom of the first page of the questionnaire. The timeframe for the NCP update process is expected to be 12-18 months, and whatever time you can contribute to the effort would be appreciated.

While the NCP is under review, GCA can still propose NC-funded projects and also undertake smaller-scale projects using a combination of community resources and neighborhood volunteers. The questionnaire is intended to identify and prioritize these efforts to guide us through 2019.

On the first page, the questionnaire explains the types of projects usually covered by NC funds and provides space to enter your

suggestions. Suggested projects will be evaluated using the established Neighborhood Conservation Program process. The recent significant budget reduction in NC funding may impact the number of new projects that can be pursued county-wide, so having clear Glencarlyn priorities will help us compete more effectively for county funding.

On the second page, the form includes one list of suggested projects from past GCA discussions and another of recently-suggested environmental projects. Also, there is space under each list for you to add projects. We ask you to indicate your top three priorities for each list.

As stated in the NCP, "Glencarlyn has evolved over 120 years from a village in the country to a village in the city. Buffered on three sides by park land, yet well connected to nearby urban amenities, this neighborhood preserves a wonderful diversity of housing types, schools, traditions, innovation and community values that together create a remarkable quality of life. The underlying purpose of this Plan is to preserve that balance." Come to the October 1 GCA meeting to help support this goal.

View from the Garden

Sweet Basil: The Taste of a Summer Herb Captured for Fall

Walking through the culinary and fragrance herb gardens of the Glencarlyn Library Community Garden in July and August, you will find a treasure trove of herbs to smell and taste. Basil, parsley, thyme, sage, lemongrass, stevia, lemon verbena, lovage, lemon balm, fennel, and more compete for space and sun in the Culinary Garden. Lavender, rosemary, sweet annie, oregano, pineapple sage, and anise hyssop reside in the Fragrance Garden and invite you to rub their leaves and smell their varied scents.

Basil is our "summer into fall" subject. This is one of the herbs that is an ingredient for food or drink served as "tastes" at our annual AutumnFest celebration. Two taste-tested recipes are included below.


Sweet basil belongs to the genus Ocimum thought to be derived from the Greek ozo which means to smell, for most of its species are aromatic plants in both odor and flavor. "Native to areas in Asia and Africa, basil was brought from India to Europe in the 16th century, and subsequently to America in the 17th century." (1)

All basils are tender annuals which are easy to grow, but are very susceptible to cold weather. They should be planted in late spring after all danger of frost is past and the nighttime temperatures are reliably above 65 degrees. To produce high quality basil, grow it in full sun in warm, well-drained soil with a pH around 6.4.

On average, basils grows 12-18 inches tall and foliage color can range from green to purple. There are many named varieties. Italian (Genovese), Lettuce Leaf, Red Opal, and Thai are all popular sweet basil varieties. Scented basils include Lemon, Licorice and Cinnamon. Leaves may be used fresh or dried, however drying diminishes flavor.

Ocimum basilicum, Sweet Basil has become a culinary classic. Its distinctively flavored leaves are added to many foods, such as Italian-style tomato dishes, pesto sauce, and Thai-style salads or meals. Basil's essential oils and oleo-resins may be extracted from leaves and flowers and used for flavoring vinegars, oils, and liqueurs or for fragrance in perfumes, shampoos, and soaps.

Traditionally, basil has been used as a medicinal plant in treatment of headaches, coughs, diarrhea, constipation, warts,



antihypertensive, anti-cancer, and antiinflammatory activity. Different authors have described the antibacterial properties of this essential oil as well." (4)

Recipes

Cherry Basil Gazpacho

A tongue tingling taste treat: cherry basil gazpacho.

Ingredients:

- 2 lbs. ripe tomatoes, cored & chopped
 ½ lb. sweet cherries, pitted
 1 small Italian frying pepper, seeded & chopped
- 1½ cups day-old crustless, rustic white bread
- ½ cup chopped red onion
- · 1/4 cup sherry vinegar
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- · ½ cup plus ⅓ cup extra-virgin olive oil
- Kosher salt and pepper
- · 1 cup packed basil leaves

Directions:

- In a large bowl, toss the tomatoes with the cherries, Italian pepper, bread, red onion, vinegar, garlic, ½ cup of olive oil, and a very generous pinch each of salt and pepper. Let stand at room temperature for two hours.
- In batches, puree gazpacho until very smooth, about 2 mins. Transfer to another bowl. Cover and refrigerate for at least 3 hours or overnight.
- 3. In a small saucepan, blanch the basil, about 1 min. Drain well and cool under running water. Squeeze out excess moisture. Transfer to blender, and with machine running, add remaining 1/3 cup olive oil until mixture is bright green and very smooth. Strain and season with salt.



While Jerry practiced his craft, I mucked out some of the trash and debris that had accumulated in the small springhouse erected by the Glencarlyn community many decades ago. We were gratified to find that the spring still produces a small flow of clear water (although no one should consider drinking it). The rest is history

On a serious note, Moses Ball Spring barely survived the original construction of what was then the Northern Virginia Doctors Hospital circa 1959. It seems the historical significance of the spring was grudgingly recognized and the landscaped hospital grounds were built around it in a way that preserved it, after a fashion.

But the spring was hidden in a depression and the changes to the surrounding land surface must have altered its hydrology and reduced its flow.

The spring forms part of the headwaters of a small stream nicknamed Salamander Run that holds Arlington's only population of Three-lined Salamanders.

and redevelop the Urgent Care property. So it's good for Glencarlyn to be aware of the spring and express our interest in its preservation.

After all, Moses Ball Spring has been a part of Glencarlyn since before Glencarlyn was formed, and our community has preserved it for over one hundred years.

4. Drizzle basil oil on top of gazpacho and serve.

Basil Pesto

Fresh basil ready for cooking.

This recipe will make enough pesto for four pounds of pasta.

Ingredients:

- · 4 cups fresh basil leaves, washed and dried (use a lettuce spinner or roll gently in a clean dish towel)
- · 10-12 large garlic cloves, cut in pieces
- · 1 cup walnuts, chopped
- · 1 cup almonds, chopped
- ½ cup extra virgin olive oil the better the oil, the better the pesto
- 2 cups grated fresh Parmesan cheese (not from the green can!)
- · 1/2 cup grated fresh Romano cheese (you can use all Parmesan, if Romano is not available)

Directions:

- Combine the basil, garlic, and nuts in the bowl of a food processor and process until pasty.
- 2. When it starts to get thick, add the oil in a slow, steady stream. Process until smooth.
- 3. Turn off the food processor.
- 4. Add the cheeses and a generous amount of pepper and process again to combine. Add additional olive oil if you prefer a thinner consistency.
- 5. The pesto can be added to hot pasta and served immediately or added to hot pasta and chilled.
- 6. Refrigerate leftover pesto in sealed container or freeze.

Variations:

- Add cherry tomatoes cut in half for color and flavor before serving.
- · For a creamier consistency, add half and half or heavy cream to pesto before adding to pasta.

APS forecasts a 75 percent growth over the next 10 years. Forecasts are for the total to reach 30,000 students in 2022, he said.

Goldstein outlined a number of building projects and other school system initiatives designed to meet the student numbers challenge. Besides new construction, the effort also involves relocating some school programs. For instance, the school building on Vacation Lane will become an elementary school, while the current HB Woodlawn high school will move elsewhere

Goldstein also addressed Glencarlyn residents concerns about the future use of the Kenmore Middle School site, particularly any use that could increase pedestrian and vehicle traffic on Carlin Springs Road. There is "quite a bit of land" at the Kenmore site and it was among several potential candidates for new high school, he said. But "we're going to need the county to do traffic and pedestrian safety improvements before we add more people to that site," he added.

Goldstein invited Glencarlyn residents to contact the School Board with concerns and questions through the Engage with APS website *https://www.apsva.us/engage/*. The website was designed to help citizens stay informed about planning and other topics for school board action. It includes a feature

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Softening Home Prices in the

Near Future? According to Zillow, home price appreciation is slowing in nearly half of the country's 35 largest metropolitan areas. The slowdown doesn't appear to be due merely to a limited number of homes on the market, instead it seems to be driven by dissident demand from homebuyers, not just a low supply of homes for sale. As home prices have increased faster than wages for 70 straight months, some buyers in high cost markets have finally had enough, at least for now.

Until incomes start to rise, we may not see as much appreciation. However, barring another financial crisis, experts don't expect a repeat of last decade's housing crash. We're seeing the first indications that price appreciation may be slowing, but the underlying fundamental housing market conditions support a natural moderation of house prices rather than a sharp decline. The supply of existing homes for sale remains near its lowest levels in decades, and every real estate market has its own hyper local trends.

Some areas of the country have a larger gap between wage growth and price increases, which could shrink with more housing supply and a growing economy as wages are pushed upwards. Even in markets where appreciation has slowed, prices remain high and sellers continue to have the upper hand, according to Zillow.

As the fall season begins in the Metro DC area, we will monitor the frequency of multiple contracts on fresh listings. That may be the earliest sign of the local market's temperature, whether it might be cooling down or heating up. There is some concern that price increases may be hitting a ceiling as the average household income in the DC area has matched the affordability for the average home price.

allowing citizens to comment electronically on issues.

The school board also holds open office hours on Monday evenings at its new offices on the second floor of the Syphax Building, 2100 Washington Blvd.

Gladis Bourdouane, APS integrated project planner, spoke about realigning elementary school boundaries. She noted that boundary changes will be implemented for four schools this year.

None of the schools in the 2018 changes affect schools in the Glencarlyn area, but Carlin Springs Elementary School is slated

for changes in the fall 2019 or spring 2020 boundary process, according to Bourdouane's presentation. She said among the factors used in considering boundary changes are efficiency, stability, and alignment (minimizing separation of small groups of students from their classmates when moving between school levels).

Demographics are another factor, she said — particularly economic diversity. "When we're moving kids we want to look at who we're moving and what that does" to the spread of economic diversity among schools, Bourdouane said.
