Volunteers recently loaded scores of bicycles onto a 40 foot container in front of Dixie Duncan's house on Kensington St. S. in Glencarlyn.

A couple of days later the two-wheelers were in Puerto Rico.

The organization, Wheels to Africa (WTA), founded by her son Winston in 2005, sent up to 400 bikes to the island which was hit by Hurricane Maria in 2017,

leaving transport and other infrastructure devastated.

WTA also sent crutches, wheelchairs, helmets, and shoes to the island.

"They're American citizens, and I personally felt like we need to do what we can to help," Duncan said.

WTA collects bicycles in the Washington, D.C. area and other locations in the United

View from the Garden

Winter Pruning Can Improve Your Landscape

During the winter months, while the garden is dormant, you have a chance to find and correct any landscape issues concerning deciduous trees.

With the leaf canopy off you can easily spot broken, twisted, crossed branches, dead wood and hanging branches. Removing these issues should be done during the late winter before spring arrives.

Identifying what to prune

The first step is identifying what needs improvement. Carefully remove any loose branches, and carefully cut/saw any hanging or broken branches or limbs (**Figure #1**).

Use sharp hand pruners, loppers, or pruning saw to remove these branches.

If the limb is too big for you to remove it safely than contact a tree care company. Contact a certified arborist if you are not sure of any aspect of this article.

Questions to ask yourself

Now look carefully at the remaining tree form and structure. Are any branches too low, hanging over a driveway or walkway? Is the tree too close to the house? If so you may want to consider removing the whole tree or do extensive shaping.

Are branches crossing each other or does the tree look too heavy with too many limbs on one side and not enough on the other?

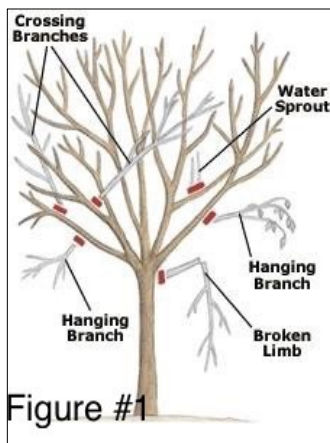

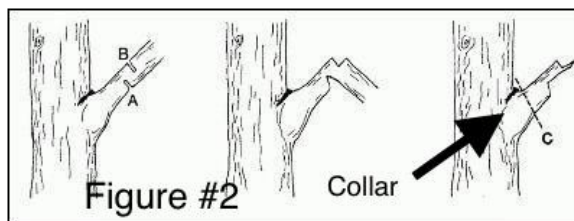

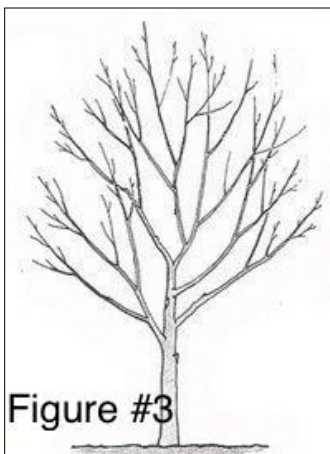

Does the tree look balanced with equal spread all around? Improving the appearance of your trees will enhance your property and promote a healthier tree.

Three steps to a good cut

When removing a branch or limb, there is a three step process that will keep you safe and keep your tree healthy.

1. First, make a cut at between a few inches to a foot away from the trunk and about 1/4 the way through from the underside.
2. Your second cut will be from the top of the branch and further away to remove the bulk and weight of the branch. If this limb is large you should have a pro do this.
3. Your final cut will be just to the outside of the tree 'collar'.

This collar is located at the junction of every branch as it connects to the next limb heading towards the trunk. This third cut is the surgical cut and is the most important in keeping your tree healthy (**Figure #2**).

When cut properly, after a few years, the collar will heal and seal. This seal will protect the tree from insects and diseases.

If you cut too close to the collar area you will make it difficult for the tree to heal properly. In **Figure #3** you will note the profile of a typically healthy tree.

states for needy communities

Among other things, the bikes provide people with transportation to a doctor or school, and to retrieve food and water, WTA says.

Since it was launched, the organization has sent more than 9,500 bicycles to African nations and to countries in the Americas.

"We utilize connections in the metro area to determine where the bicycles will go," Duncan said.

"We have sent bikes to Namibia, Kenya, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Tanzania, Honduras, Haiti" and other countries," she added.

Along with collecting bicycles for needy communities in the Americas and Africa, WTA "serves as an educational and volunteer platform for American youth to develop leadership skills through civic engagement."

The charity has hosted nine volunteers who have traveled to Africa for a three week adventure tour which includes research on bicycle empowerment and experiencing African culture.

The Arlington County Police Department (ACPD) is warning the public about a fundraising phone scam targeting county residents.

Residents have contacted the police department after receiving unsolicited phone calls from individual(s) claiming to be with the department and requesting donations to benefit disabled and underprivileged children, the ACPD said in an on-line press release.

"The Arlington County Police Department is reminding citizens that representatives of this agency have never and will never call to solicit funds or collect fines," it said.

Become an informed consumer

The department suggests the following procedures if you are approached or contacted by a charitable solicitor:

Request to see the solicitor's identification.

Research the cause and organization you are considering donating to. Ask questions of the solicitor such as:

In 2017, for the first time in its history, WTA sent two 40-foot containers containing a total of 956 bicycles to Africa. The next collection was scheduled for Jan. 26 in Thousand Oaks, CA. That collection will probably be sent to Zanzibar, Duncan said.

Winston, now 24, is still involved in the WTA operations, as he has been for the past 12-plus years. "He coordinates collections and loads the 40 foot container," Duncan said.

WTA is "dedicated to my mother whom my son loved dearly," she said. "Their relationship is the reason Winston learned compassion at a early age - my mom had COPD and other medical issues related to smoking for years so Winston was her helper and she taught him to help her and be kind."

The youngster decided to form WTA after seeing a need for such transportation while on a trip to southern Africa.
