## GC Branch Library Avoids Being Cut From County Budget

The Glencarlyn Branch Library has survived another Arlington County budget that could potentially have closed the facility.

The County Board did not include what County Manager Mark Schwartz, called an "optional proposal to eliminate services at Glencarlyn" in its 2020 financial plan, adopted April 23.

Board Member Libby Garvey said over the next year, the county needs to "take a holistic look at what exactly the library of the $21^{\text {st }}$ century is going to look like" - and include the public in the process.

Board Chairman Christian Dorsey said April 2 there will be further discussions with staff and the Schwarz about the future of the Glencarlyn Library in the context of delivering services at the west end of Columbia Pike.

Board members now understand "how critical Glencarlyn Library is to the many communities that need it most," said Julie Lee, president of the Glencarlyn Citizens’ Association.

The library can play a "vital role in the development and enrich

## Parking Lot Beds at Library Get Major Re-do

Master gardeners at the Glencarlyn Library have been renovating the garden beds along the parking lot. As the growing season progresses, local residents will see dozens of new plantings and a more intentional, holistic design that highlights native plants.
The parking lot beds have evolved over the years to include an eclectic collection of native and non -native perennial shrubs, flowers, grasses and bulbs, many installed by interns as part of their Master Gardener certification.
Over the years, the beds have changed. Sections have become shady as the oaks and sweet gum in the cemetery have grown. In the beds themselves, plants have matured, some have become aggressive, reseeding liberally, while others have underperformed or died due to the challenging conditionscars, foot traffic and intense weather.

The renovation underway will honor the past by incorporating a selection of plantings from each of the intern beds into a new design that emphasizes complementary and contrasting swaths of colors, textures and shapes across the length of the parking lot. Once completed, plants found in eastern woodland, meadow and cottage garden landscapes will be on view with appropriate signage.


Helianthus divaricitus \& Solidago caesia

Highlights from the new garden plan, a copy of which will be available in the educational box on the garden patio, include:

New structural plants: Ceanothus americanus (New Jersey tea), awarded 2019 Wildflower of the year by the Virginia Native Plant Society; Itea virginica 'Merlot' (Virginia sweetspire 'Merlot') and Comptonia peregrina (sweet fern).

Edibles: Asparagus, low bush blueberries, okra and rhubarb.
 - Grasses: Schizachyrium scoparium (little bluestem), Tridens flavus (purpletop grass) and Elymus hystrix (bottlebrush grass).

Three types of blazing star: L. spicata (dense blazing star), L. scariosa (blazing star) and $L$. pilosa (grass-leaf blazing star).

- New ground covers: Zizia aurea (golden Alexander), Conoclinium coelestinum (blue mistZizia aurea-new ground cover flower) and Phlox subulata (moss phlox).

Plants have been selected with an eye to creating a
 welcoming environment for birds, butterflies, pollinators and other wildlife.
Newcomer sweet fern, for example, supports 64 species of caterpillars-the larval stage of butterflies and moths-which are nutrient dense foods that provide birds with a huge proportion of their diets.
Funding for renovating the parking lot beds is possible thanks to money raised from the library garden's annual Spring Celebration and Autumnfest and the generosity of master gardener volunteers and community members.

(Kenmore Middle, Carlin Springs and Campbell Elementary) attested to the library branch's value to their students.
She quoted a teacher who said, 'Many of our students come from families without cars and this is the only walkable resource they have - especially for the students that don't
