School Board Chair Tannia Talento outlines APS activities in 2019-20

Arlington County Public Schools has many challenges in the coming year, and we were very fortunate to have Board Chair Tannia Talento attend the October 2019 Glencarlyn Citizens Association meeting to review the Arlington Public Schools' (APS) 2019-20 School Board Action Plan.

Talento began the meeting by explaining that APS is focusing on student success and making well-being a top priority. They look to increase achievement for students and eliminate opportunity gaps by hiring a new officer of equity, diversity, and inclusion; improve mental health measures and access to mental health resources for students through staff training and partnering with Arlington County service providers; and helping each student find a school-based adult or adults who will support and encourage them in their academic and personal growth.

The APS Board is in the middle of the hiring process for three important positions. Besides hiring for two new positions, the diversity officer and a

partnership coordinator, the school board is fully involved in the search for new Superintendent. Dr. Murphy, the previous superintendent, resigned in June 2019. Virginia law requires hiring a new school superintendent within 180 days. APS plans to ask for an extension as the board expects it will take a full year to hire for the open position.

A ten-year capital improvement plan (CIP) will be drafted during the second half of the school year. APS has been working with the county on both population growth estimates and facility needs. CIP planning will begin early 2020 and she encourages involvement by all interested parties.

Part of the planning for 2020-21 will focus on building utilization and neighborhood school boundaries. With new elementary and middle schools opening this year, APS will again review boundaries and look for feedback from APS Staff and community members regarding placement of choice schools (Claremont Immersion, Key Immersion, Campbell EL, Montessori, and Arlington Traditional School). Specifically discussing if the schools' locations would be better suited for neighborhood schools which will cut down on walking or bussing needs. including a naturalist, native plants from Hill House Nursery, garden related information, crafts and vendors of hand-crafted items. The Ball Sellers house opened its doors for visitors. The educational talks were particularly well-attended. Special thanks to the library and Steve Carr for opening on a day off and hosting two of the talks.

With the closing of Country Gardens, the garden coordinators will search for ways to continue to offer their most popular plants and seasonal items. The next event, the 2020 Spring Celebration and Plant Sale, is scheduled for May 3.

Audubon at Home

A story in the September 2018 Village View invited Glencarlynites to help the garden become certified as a Wildlife Sanctuary through the Audubon at Home program. Garden visitors were invited to document sightings of any of 40 "Sanctuary Species" in need of support in Northern Virginia. To be certified, 10 Sanctuary Species must be seen. Glencarlyn Library Garden received its Certification in August, and has

mounted a sign proclaiming its Wildlife Sanctuary status.

Given that the garden was able to earn Certification in less than a year (the program allows up to three years), other community members should feel encouraged that they, too, can also achieve Certification. The first step is to request a free visit from an *Audubon at Home* Ambassador who explains the program and its Healthy Yard Pledge and helps identify plants within the yard and areas of potential improvement. 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Glencarlyn's Deer - Friendly Foes?

Glencarlyn is a rich and diverse neighborhood when it comes to wild-life. Many of us marvel at the sounds of owls and foxes at night or watch in amusement as squirrels climb the trees and rabbits scamper from lawn to lawn. But what has become a mix of delightful and frustrating are the deer that have adopted Glencarlyn Park and Long Branch Nature Center as their home territory. We post on Facebook and share pictures when deer wander close to our homes and vent to each other when our flowers and shrubbery are chewed by a wandering four-legged herbivore.

Many residents of Glencarlyn think these occurrences are quite common but it is actually a new phenomenon. Even twenty years ago, a deer sighting in Glencarlyn was rare. Now it has become a near daily experience. According to the Virginia Deer Management Plan published in 2015, deer population now exceeds what the first settlers found when Virginia was settled in the late 1600s.

In late August, Glencarlyn resident Steve Young attended a forum on deer management led by Bill Browning, Arlington Regional Master Naturalist, and I interviewed Alonso Abugattas, Natural Resources Manager for Arlington County Parks focusing on what Arlington is doing about the growing deer population.

Village View (VV): How many deer are in Glencarlyn Park and Long Branch Nature Center?

Abugattas: We do not know how many deer are in Glencarlyn or Arlington, we assume there is more than ever but a survey has not been done. [Editor's note: a herd of a dozen deer was spotted last year on the edge of Long Branch Nature Center and the VHC property by Steve Young] We hope to have a better handle on how many deer there are in the future, what is a sustainable amount, and what is ecologically feasible in our area.

The County is not ignoring the problem and plans to update our natural resource management plan at the same time as the urban forestry plan in the next 18 months to two years.

Arlington is watching what neighboring municipalities are doing to manage deer. As of now hunting is not legal in the county and deer sterilization is not legal in the state of Virginia.

From Bill Browning's forum on deer management: VA Department of Game and Inland Fisheries only approves of Deer Sterilization for research purposes and not management. Many resource managers feel that hunting is more effective and humane for the deer than over-population. Effective deer predators such as wolves and cougars are extinct from our area. Deer population growth in Arlington is only limited by available food and the occasional vehicular accident. Accidents are most common during mating season and risks are greater on high-speed roads.

VV: What do deer eat and what are they attracted to?

Abugattas: Deer eat plants, nuts, berries, any tender plants. Deer favorites include strawberry plants, orchids, fresh and new growth, Hosta, flower heads, oak leaves, and acorns. There is not much that deer won't eat. However, they are not as used to non-native plants BUT there is no such thing as a deer resistant plant. Also, deer typically do not like Spice Bushes, Pawpaws, and spiky or fuzzy plants. Yet, this can differ regionally and what is available to eat.

Essentially, if a deer is hungry enough, it will eat nearly any type of vegetation.

Browning: The Deer population is out of balance in Northern Virginia. Deer browsing (feeding) has left local forests without the ability to regrow and regenerate as deer eat new growth. Not enough native species with enough diversity remain to sustain native wildlife species. Deer also negatively affects forest bird species who are left without food and habitat for themselves.

VV: What can keep deer away from your yard?

Abugattas: Deer repellents are of limited use. Fencing may work but deer have always been here and do not see people as a threat.

If you have a deer in your yard, you can try to shoo it away or fence it out, but deer are very mobile and have little fear of people. Fortunately, deer also rarely show aggressive behavior to people but may be aggressive to other deer.

VV: Can we attribute an increase in Lyme Disease in Arlington to the increase of deer?

Abugattas: The main carriers of Lyme Disease are deer ticks, but the main carrier of deer ticks are small mammals.

Deer do not automatically equal deer ticks. Ticks do not always equal Lyme Disease.

Browning: There is conflicting research on the impact of deer on the incidence of Lyme Disease. Some studies have shown that you can have a decrease in deer population and no accompanying decline in Lyme. Current research focusing on role of small mammals that thrive in degraded forests, such as forests that have been over-browsed by deer.

Abugattas emphasized that the folks in Glencarlyn (and Arlington) are very knowledgeable and well intentioned. There is plenty of time for public comment and interaction as the county looks to update its natural resource management plan.

Browning closed his session with these actions we can take: Learn about the importance of healthy forests and habitat; Keep your distance from deer; Educate friends and neighbors about the impact of deer in our area; And advocate for deer management to restore ecosystem balance.

We value new members because they help the club keep its focus on the basics and recognize where we might learn more. You do not have to be an active investor to benefit from this investment knowledge.



With the continued appreciation and competitive bidding in the Arlington real estate market, it can be challenging for an appraiser to find past sales to support the price the buyer and seller have agreed to. If a buyer is getting a mortgage, the lender in most cases requires a third-party appraisal to assess the property's market value. Appraisals guidelines require appraisers to use comparable home sales over the last 3 to 6 months. The most recent sales are given more weight than sales 6+ months ago.

I have personally witnessed a fair number of low appraisals in Arlington this year. Typically, appraisal values lag actual market appreciation by several months, and a lot depends on the time of year a home sells. Properties that are sold in the first quarter of the year use comparable data from the 3rd and 4th quarter of the prior year, which might not reflect as active a period as the first half of the year might. The appraiser is then working with lower sales prices from a slower selling season.

If the appraised value comes in at or over the purchase price, all is good with the lender. If the appraised value is lower than the purchase price, the lender will loan on the appraised value. In a normal scenario, the buyer can negotiate a reduced sales price to match the appraised value or work out a compromise with the seller. If the buyer waives the appraisal contingency, they are legally committed to cover the difference between the sale price and appraised value, which means more cash to cover the gap. In some situations the buyer can change the type of loan they are using.

For home sellers, having a pricing strategy and a savvy listing agent to help negotiate multiple offers can result in buyers waiving both home inspection and appraisal contingencies. Pricing higher than the market can diminish chances of bidding wars, and the buyer can negotiate an appraisal and home inspection issues.
