Virginians are electing a new governor, lieutenant governor, and attorney general. Additionally, Glencarlyn's representative to the House of Delegates; an Arlington County board member, and a School Board member.

You have 3 ways to vote:

- Glencarlynites can vote at their normal polling place on November 2, at Kenmore Middle School. Polls are open from 6 am to 7 pm.

- You can vote by mail. You must request a ballot by

Neighborhood Conservation (NC) Update

Awaiting Construction Schedule for 4th St. S. (S. Kensington to S. Illinois) NC Street Improvement Project

The construction contract has been approved and awarded for this project. The construction work schedule is not yet available but is still anticipated to start this summer. A pre-construction meeting will be scheduled 1-2 weeks prior to the start of hardscape work.

Water main and gas line work have been completed. Comcast and Verizon have transferred their lines from the old to new utility pole and the old pole has been removed.

As more information becomes available on the construction schedule it will be updated in the Village View and on Glencarlyn.org under the NC Activities tab.

Planning Continues on Proposed NC Project for Kenmore Wooded Area

The Arlington County Neighborhood Conservation (NC) Program staff recently provided a draft list of improvements for Glencarlyn's proposed Neighborhood Conservation project. The improvements are for the wooded area at the west end of the Kenmore Middle School property, as well as the S. Manchester St. entrance and frontage, the 2nd St. S. dead end, and the east side of S. Manchester St.

The draft list was reviewed at the July 12 GCA Executive Committee meeting. Improvements include treating and removing invasive plant material; evaluating the health of existing trees and removing those that are dead, dying or diseased; replacing an old wooden fence with a low stone wall along S. Manchester St.; and adding native grass, plants and trees in various locations. For a more detailed description of the proposed project,

Hold the Date: September 30 THE LATINO/A/X EXPERIENCE IN ARLINGTON

A panel discussion on the challenges faced by our Latino/a/x neighbors in Arlington will take place via Zoom on Thursday, September 30, at 7:30.

The latest in a series of events organized by the GCA's Racial Diversity and Inclusion (REI) Committee, this program will provide an overview of the history of Latinos/a/x in the U.S. and feature a panel discussion about the lived experience of Latinos/o/x in Arlington.

Notices and details about how to register for that program will be forthcoming in early September.

Previously during the 2020-21 fiscal year, the REI Committee organized and co-facilitated three workshops, all via Zoom, that focused on the history of racist policies and practices in housing and education, on Black-White relationships in Glencarlyn and elsewhere in Arlington County, and on how to actively foster greater diversity and inclusion in the neighborhood

Additionally, the GCA passed a Resolution on Inclusion and Equity during the November 2020 meeting and – to reflect the GCA's commitment to fostering greater inclusiveness – changed the name of the association from Glencarlyn Citizens' Association to Glencarlyn Civic Association.

Most recently, the committee organized a walking tour of the Halls Hill neighborhood, guided by long-time Halls Hill resident, community activist, and author Wilma Jones, who had discussed her book, *My Halls Hill Family: More Than a Neighborhood*, at the committee's previous program in May. (The book can be borrowed from the Arlington County Library and purchased on amazon.com.)

Fairweather Retires as Manager of Long Branch Nature Center

As a young boy, Cliff Fairweather spent many days chasing turtles and snakes, studying insects, and building dams along the stream in the woods near his Alexandria home. But he didn't envision making a living educating people about nature. "Being a 'naturalist' is a relatively new profession," he says.

In college, Cliff pursued another interest, politics and international relations, and upon graduation he began a career in government contracting.

Still, Cliff enjoyed the outdoors and became an avid birdwatcher. He also volunteered for the Audubon Naturalist Society, monitoring water quality and performing other tasks that brought satisfaction. The tug of nature was strong, and so he eventually secured a grant that enabled him to work fulltime for the Audubon Naturalist Society. At the age of 41, after about fifteen years working for defense contractors, Cliff changed careers.

"I found my real vocation," said Cliff, who went back to college and got a master's degree in Natural Resources so he could pursue his life-long love of nature while helping others enjoy and appreciate the natural world. Cliff retired in July after nine years as a Natural Resources Specialist and manager of the Long Branch Nature Center adjacent to the Glencarlyn neighborhood.

Cliff oversaw the center's many education programs for adults and children, while also managing the staff that cared for the snakes, turtles, frogs, birds, fish, and other animals housed at Long Branch. Many in the Glencarlyn neighborhood will recognize Cliff as the friendly naturalist who answered their questions and, along with his staff, gave hands-on tutorials about the center's animals. He enjoyed immensely this aspect of working at the center.

"A naturalist is someone who interprets nature for people in a way that is interesting and inspiring, so that it motivates them to learn, teach others, and protect the environment," he says. "That's what I try to do."

Cliff also enjoyed walking through the park, talking to visitors along its streams and trails, and helping them understand the sights and sounds of Glencarlyn Park. The park is home to Red-shouldered Hawks, Barred Owls, box turtles, woodpeckers, and flying squirrels, and a stopping place for numerous migrating birds, including warblers, thrushes, Yellow-billed Cuckoos, and Great Blue Herons. And the streams and ponds are habitat for frogs, salamanders, and water snakes.



"There's almost something new every day to see and catch your interest," he says.

The nature center depends heavily on volunteers, many from the Arlington Regional Master Naturalist (ARMN) program and local high schools. "We couldn't care for the animals or put on our many different programs without the help of our volunteers," he says. "They are essential to the services we provide."

View from the Garden

Four Blazing Stars for the Garden

Over the past two years, the Glencarlyn Library Community Garden has added four species of Blazing Stars to the newly renovated beds bordering the parking lot. These are all attractive perennial native wildflowers that homeowners may want to consider for their own gardens.



Dense Blazing Star (Liatris spicata)

Dense Blazing Star or Gayfeather (Liatris spicata), the tallest of these plants at two to four feet, can add a vertical accent and is especially effective when planted en masse in sunny to partially shady borders, butterfly gardens, and meadows in moist to wet soil. It features rigid stems with densely packed spikes of disk flowers that bloom from July to August above a tuft of grass-like basal leaves. The pinkish-

purple blossoms offer nectar to bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds, and songbirds enjoy the seeds that develop.

Liatris scariosa, known as Large or Eastern Blazing Star, is an upright, clump-forming plant with a basal tuft of narrow, lance-shaped leaves and leafy flower stems. The reddish-purple, thistle-

like flowers are spaced along the stems on short stalks and bloom from August into October. This species grows in full sun and dry to moist soils and is tolerant of summer heat and humidity but not wet soil in winter. Like Gavfeather, its inflorescences bloom from top to bottom, attracting bees

and butterflies to borders and cottage gardens.

Scaly Blazing Star (Liatris squarrosa) has one or more erect, unbranched stems one to three feet tall with relatively few small, linear leaves. The tuft-like redviolet flower heads are widely spaced on a spike at the top of the stems and begin blooming in June for about a month. This species prefers full sun and dry soil that is rocky or sandy in texture. It can be used in small groups in the middle of borders or pollinator gardens where it attracts bees, butterflies, moths, and hummingbirds.

Dwarf Blazing Star (*Liatris microcephala*), native to the southern Appalachians, is the most diminutive species,

measuring 1 to 2 feet tall. It has a mounded tuft of grass-like basal leaves and clusters of four to six orchid-colored disk florets spaced along multiple upright flower stems from July into October. This drought-tolerant plant grows best in full sun and lean, dry soil with good drainage, especially in winter. It is an excellent accent

or edging plant for border fronts and rock gardens where it attracts butterflies and hummingbirds.





including project history and photos, go to Glencarlyn.org under the NC Activities tab.

Please keep in mind that this proposed scope of work is not final. It is still being investigated and discussed by county staff and Arlington Public Schools (APS). As the property owner of the wooded area and adjacent locations, APS will have a major voice in determining the final scope of work. It may not be possible to include all the ideas listed in the draft document in one NC project. Some items that GCA proposed may need to go into a future NC project or be pursued by collaboration between APS and GCA.

Remote Work and Mobility

Working from home became the reality for many individuals during the pandemic. Recent data identified remote work and mobility as a huge influence on the real estate market. The pandemic universally caused a movement away from urban cores particularly for those with higher incomes who could afford to move and for lower-income individuals seeking lower costs of living. Most of these relocations remained within their original region (84%) and, while some are returning, it is unknown as to the permanence of these movements or whether they are a true urban exodus. With the added mobility remote work offers, where people are moving and where they can ultimately purchase a home is less dependent on a physical office location. This flexibility is giving remote workers the opportunity to move to more affordable areas, buying more home for their money.

For first time buyers, the low housing inventory home prices are growing almost seven times faster than renter incomes, making what was likely already the biggest challenge for firsttime home buyers - saving for a down payment - even more difficult. But there is good news for today's first-time buyers: With record low mortgage rates, monthly payments are affordable even with a smaller down payment, and flexible work options are providing new opportunities for many to buy a home in a less-expensive area if they don't have to commute to the big city. And while housing supply is still low, we are seeing steady increases in the number of homes coming to market, which gives hope to homebuyers.
