County Board Vice-Chair Speaks at October GCA Meeting

Arlington County Board Vice-Chair Christian Dorsey's presentation at the October 2022 GCA meeting touched upon many topics of concern for Glencarlyn and Arlington County.

Along with a lengthy discussion on the Arlington County Missing Middle Study, Dorsey touched on other items of concern for the county board. The county is looking to change building and zoning ordinances to allow for different use types in commercially zoned properties to remedy the shift in proportion of real estate tax burden on residential properties as commercial vacancies remain high post pandemic. The board is committed to continued reduction in greenhouse gases and climate change issues in its partnership with the Washington DC region council governments.

Additionally, Dorsey when questioned by an attendee about the increased usage of rental scooters and electric bikes within Arlington and the 9-abandoned scooters and devices





Glencarlyn's Neighborhood Survey on Missing Middle

Thanks to all who took time to complete the neighborhood survey on Missing Middle upzoning. 128 households responded online, a very good response rate. 76.6% of the respondents would like to see Glencarlyn remain a community of single-family homes, 10.2% support duplexes and tri-plexes. A majority think the County should do further evaluation of the potential impacts on traffic, on-street parking, school population and tree canopy. Over 90% believe missing middle housing would increase on-street parking and 72.4% felt the **onsite** parking ratio should remain at 1 car per unit. Approximately 80% are concerned about neighborhood traffic and the loss of tree canopy.

What is most telling from this survey is revealed in the comments. Glencarlyn residents care deeply about, and truly love, their park and natural surroundings. They appreciate our quiet, somewhat secluded neighborhood, our library and garden and community center, caring neighbors and our community spirit.

Invasive Treatment Continues on Kenmore Wooded Area Project

The draft project scope is to improve the wooded area at the west end of the Kenmore Middle School property (from the dead end to the edge of the ball field), as well as the S. Manchester St. entrance and frontage, the 2nd St. S. dead end, and the east side of S. Manchester St.

IPC, the invasive control contractor hired by Arlington County, completed the fall 2022 course of treatment of the wooded area in October. Remaining treatments are scheduled for summer and fall of 2023, and summer of 2024. Signs are posted when the treatments occur and the area being treated is safe to enter.

Wetland Studies and Solutions, a consulting firm hired by the county, has completed a tree survey which includes a plan and a spreadsheet with tree inventory data. The plan is to evaluate the existing trees for removal, pruning or keeping once the treatments are complete.

The rest of the project is contingent on the availability of engineering staff to design the remaining items in the draft plan. An engineer on the team recently left the county and the impact on the project's schedule is not yet known.

Once the design information is available, there will be refinement of the draft plan, as was anticipated when the project was approved and funded. Some items that GCA proposed may need to go into a future AN project or be pursued by collaboration between APS and GCA. As the plan is refined, more information will be provided about the scope of work.



along our streets and parks. Dorsey states the county needs to revisit the permitting process for these companies. While he sees the usage of scooters/e-bikes as a good option for mobility services, Dorsey feels the county has fallen short on the education for scooter and e-bike usage, and the board has taken too much of a *Laisse-faire* policy managing these companies. Dorsey promises that he and the county manager will be meeting about scooters and e-bikes the day after the October GCA meeting.

Regarding the Missing Middle Study, Vice-Chair Dorsey stated that the studies done by the staff after looking at other jurisdictions that adjusted zoning to allow for additional *Missing Middle* style housing, they estimate only twenty units may be built each year in Arlington. These studies have also found that smaller housing styles are often more affordable than single family homes. Dorsey was questioned regarding why there is not more focus on just increasing density in heavy transit areas and caps put on areas to not overwhelm single family neighborhoods. His response to these questions state that all these issues are still open for debate as the changes in zoning regulations have not yet been voted upon.

When asked about the timeline for additional considerations for questions such as tree canopy and other concerns, he stated "the board has greatly contributed to the confusion of all of this" but the planning commission and the zoning committee of the planning commission still needs to review any proposed changes to zoning ordinances and make recommendations to the county board. The county board will need to review the proposed changed and will continue to have public meetings before any proposal is decided upon. Dorsey additionally stated that he does not expect a board vote on zoning changes may not take place until January 2023.

AutumnFest Kicks Off the Fall Season with Gardening Fun

Against the backdrop of clear blue skies and perfect fall weather, the Master Gardeners of Northern Virginia (MGNV) hosted their annual AutumnFest celebration on September 17 on the grounds of the Glencarlyn Branch Library. The event attracted the highest recorded turn-out to date: 433 adults and children participated in educational workshops and nature-related craft

activities, purchased items from local vendors and enjoyed herb-inspired food and drinks from the garden.

Three educational programs were offered, including a native plant walk and demonstrations on gardening basics by Master Gardeners, as well as an introduction to invasive plants by Arlington County Natural Resources Specialist Jennifer Soles. Educational information was also provided by Arlington Regional Master Naturalists, representatives from the Ball-

Children did craft projects focused on insects and, in the gazebo, guests, young and old, assembled fragrant sachets made from dried herbs and flowers, including lavender, rose buds, Sweet Annie and lemongrass, that were grown and dried by Master Gardener Judy Funderburk, co-founder of the Glencarlyn Library Gar-

On the patio, visitors were wowed by an array of free sweet and savory treats and drinks, including European, Indian and Middle Eastern delicacies,

that showcased more than a dozen herbs that can be grown in Northern Virginia, and took home their favorite recipes, including for Rosemary Marmalade Thumbprint Cookies.

Recipes for rosemary thumbprint cookies abound on the internet but this version is our favorite.

Many visitors also took home free trees provided by the Small Trees Make Big Canopies program and books offered by Friends of the Arlington Library. Other participants included Hill House Native Plants, and vendors of pottery, artisanal chocolate, Ukrainian painted eggs (pysanky), and local honey.

The co-coordinators of the Glencarlyn Library Garden wish to thank the Glencarlyn Branch Library, the Glencarlyn Civic Association, and the more than 25 Master Gardener volunteers who made this event possible. We also wish to thank members of the community who came out in support of the garden. All proceeds from AutumnFest benefit MGNV and help to ensure that the garden remains a welcoming, beautiful and inspirational oasis and place of learning for members of the community and beyond.

Ingredients:

1 cup butter, room temperature

2/3 cups sugar

1 tablespoon fresh rosemary, chopped

1/4 cup almonds, crushed

2 cups flour

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup orange marmalade

Directions:

Cream butter and sugar together in mixing bowl. Add rosemary, almonds, salt and flour and mix well. Refrigerate one hour until firm.

Form into 1 1/2-inch balls and arrange on an ungreased baking sheet. Press a hole into the center of each cookie with your thumb and fill with marmalade. Bake 18 minutes at 350°. Allow to cool completely before removing from baking sheets.

FRAUD ALERT: Police Share Information About Commonly Reported Scams

The Arlington County Police Department (ACPD) is sharing information on common scams and tips for how to spot, avoid and report them. Although many scams can appear convincing, remember to be cautious of unsolicited calls and emails, especially if the individual requests payment in the form of gift cards, cash or cash apps.

Report Scams: If you find that you were a target or victim of a scam, please file an <u>online police report</u> or call the Alternative Reporting Unit at 703-228-4300.

Scam #1: The Virtual Kidnapping Ransom Scam

Scammers will call potential victims stating their family member is being held captive and threaten to continue holding them hostage unless they receive payment, typically through a cash app. The scammers will provide the victim with specific instructions to ensure the safe return of the family member and order the individual to stay on the line until money is received. This particular scam creates a sense of urgency and panic as the scammers also state they will harm the family member if the money is not sent immediately. ACPD encourages the public to hang up and call 911 immediately if faced with this scam.

Scam #2: The Grandparent Scam

Scammers will target elderly victims by calling and stating their grandchild has been arrested for driving under the influence or other serious crime. The nature of the situation makes the grandchild 'unavailable' to confirm their identity by phone and the scammer will ask the victim to send money for attorney fees or bail. In some cases, the scammers impersonate the grandchild while reporting to be in a crisis situation. This particular scam preys on the fears of grandparents to get them to act quickly. If you receive a call of this nature, hang up and call 911 immediately. ACPD advises a quick way to know if this call is a scam is if the caller asks the victim not to call the grandchild's parents to confirm they have been arrested.

Scam #3: The Jury Duty Scam

Scammers will pose as law enforcement and contact victims accusing them of failing to appear for jury duty and stating a warrant for their arrest will be issued unless a fine is paid. Payment is often requested in the form of gift cards and the scammer will ask the victim to provide the gift card numbers over the phone. Scammers may also instruct the victim to send the gift cards to a police department as an added appearance of legitimacy. As a reminder, ACPD and the Sheriff's Office will never call to solicit funds or collect fines over the phone. Additionally, juror summonses are sent through the mail and communication through other mediums should be considered suspicious.

Scam #4: Spoofing

Spoofing is when a caller deliberately falsifies the information transmitted to your caller ID display to disguise their identity. Scammers often use neighbor spoofing so it appears an incoming call is coming from a local number, or spoof a number from a company or a government agency that you may already know and trust. You may not be able to tell right away if an incoming call is spoofed. If you get a call from someone who says they represent a company or a government agency, hang up and call the phone number on your account statement or on the company's or government agency's website to verify the authenticity of the call.

Fraud Crime Prevention Tips

Reduce the risk of becoming a victim of a scam by following these crime prevention tips:

- Always be suspicious of unsolicited phone calls or emails.
- Be cautious of mimicked telephone numbers and e-mail addresses.
- Never use a phone number provided to you from the caller to verify their credibility.
- Never give money or personal information to someone with whom you don't have ties and did not initiate contact with.
- Trust your instincts: if an unknown caller makes you uncomfortable or says things that don't sound right, hang up.

Take your time. If the caller puts you in fear, requests you to act quickly or states there is an emergency, it's likely a scam. Scammers create a sense of urgency to get you act impulsively and without thinking.

Remain fiscally secure by following these practices:

- Track and review your bank and credit card statements for irregular activity.
- Avoid unusual payment methods. No government agency
 or legitimate business will instruct you to resolve your debt
 using a payment method such as Bitcoin, money wires, cash
 app, mailed cash or gift cards where the identification numbers are provided over the phone.

Do not respond to e-mails or text messages requesting you to "confirm," "update," or "provide" account information.


