## The Purpose and Future of Our Glencarlyn Library November 6 GCA Meeting, 7:30 pm

Arlington Public Library has begun a study and county-wide engagement process to determine the best uses of its limited resources in the future. This study will determine where libraries are located across the County, how library space is used and how funding will be allocated to best serve the growing and changing Arlington population. The process will be managed by a contracted consultant and will last no more than 90 days. The final report will include various facility planning factors and location siting options. It will present tradeoffs among library collections, physical space, and levels of public service. In simple terms, the County will be re-envisioning and reimagining library space to "best serve" all of Arlington, which suggests that libraries of the future will be gathering places, using space for books for other purposes.

We have concerns that this "reimagining" process will include the repurposing of library resources and space to the detriment of our Glencarlyn Library. We want to ensure that the County knows how much we value our Glencarlyn Library. We want it to remain open, fully-staffed, and with shelves full of books. **To that end, we will be holding a Neighborhood Brainstorming Session at our November 6 GCA** 

**meeting at 7:30 pm in Carlin Hall.** We will hear from Glencarlyn Branch Manager Natasha Francois, and work with the Friends of Glencarlyn Library (see story below) exploring ways to bring more patrons into our library and effectively

advocate during this short County-wide engagement process for full funding and staffing for our library. The clock is running; we need to move quickly. We do not want a "library" in name only.

The Glencarlyn community has worked together in the past to ensure continued County support for our library, and the FGL group continues that proud tradition at a time when it is more important than ever.

"Our library faces its biggest challenge ever, and I believe we are up to that challenge," stated GCA president Julie Lee. "Our Glencarlyn Library has been a critical resource for our community since Samuel Burdette gifted his money, his book collection, and the land on which the current building stands. We intend to keep it that way."

This MUST be a community-wide effort. We must work together to preserve Glencarlyn Library.

# President's Corner Glencarlyn Library: Our Neighborhood Treasure

Often, we take for granted the things we treasure most. Our Glencarlyn Library is a TREASURE. WE MUST USE IT and we must support it.

As explained on page 1, the County Manager has directed Arlington Public Library (APL) to review future facility and materials funding for the system. He asked APL to engage with the community about how "best to prioritize and provide library services in a changed and

changing environment."

Knowing that this public engagement process would be happening, and hearing some confusion\* concerning removal of our shelves and books, I invited APL Director Diane Kresh to speak at our November 6 GCA meeting.

Frankly, I was STUNNED when I received Ms. Kresh' reply DECLINING our invitation.

After explaining that a 90-day, county-wide, consultant-managed engagement process would be beginning shortly (it may be underway as you read this), she wrote:

"Once the public engagement process has been determined, we will let residents and Library patrons know how they can participate. I am not accepting any invitations to talk about the Library's future while this public engagement process is underway therefore I must decline your invitation to attend the November 6 meeting."

Ms. Kresh's refusal to attend to our Nov 6th GCA meeting is disappointing and confusing.

Why would the Director of Arlington Public Library refuse to speak to communities during the public engagement process that has been set forth by the County Manager?

How is Arlington County reaching out to communities during their public engagement process?

Does the County Manager or the Director already have an agenda and a vision about where and how library resources should be allocated?

Will other facilities and programs grow at the expense of Glencarlyn Library?

Have they forgotten that Arlington Public Library began in the late 1800s with a book collection stored for the Glencarlyn community at Carlin Hall?

In 1914, General Samuel Burdett bequeathed the land, books, and money to begin a public library in Glencarlyn. Burdett Library opened in 1924. As we approach the 100th anniversary of our library, JOIN US for the Nov 6th Community Brainstorming Session to Support and Save Glencarlyn Library, 7:30pm in Carlin Hall.

We have a committed Branch Manager who has wonderful ideas to enhance and increase the use of our facility. A group of committed and concerned Friends of Glencarlyn Library (FGL) is developing plans to make our library more relevant and active. The Glencarlyn community has worked together in the past to insure funding for our library. I believe this will be our biggest challenge ever. I also believe we are up to the challenge.

\*Aging shelves were removed as part of routine maintenance, and replacements have been ordered. All our collections are at normal levels, except nonfiction, which is expected to return to normal soon.

Construction work continues along the W&OD and Four Mile Run trails as part of the Sparrow Pond Rehabilitation Project.

As of this writing, portions of Four Mile Run trail are closed, so that the county contractors can excavate, stabilize, and prepare a trench for a new pipe. There is detour signage to the W&OD trail and at the pedestrian bridge to Glencarlyn Park.

Typical work hours are 7:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday-Friday. This is a multi-phase project and construction is expected to take 12 months through August 2024.

# Arlington Neighborhoods Program (ANP) Update

#### Design work moves toward 90% milestone on Kenmore Wooded Area Project

This project will improve the wooded area at the west end of the Kenmore Middle School property, as well as the S. Manchester St. entrance and frontage, the 2<sup>nd</sup> St. S. dead end, and the east side of S. Manchester St.

The 90% design was scheduled for submission October 5, with a Final Design Meeting for the neighborhood and Arlington Public Schools (APS) to follow. The 100% design is scheduled for the end of November. Once the final plans are approved (January 2024), procurement and construction are expected to take place from February through September 2024.

A plan showing the 60% design, which is still evolving, is posted on Glencarlyn.org under ANP Projects. After the plantings are established, neighborhood volunteers will be responsible for maintaining them, and several neighbors have already volunteered to do this.

As the design work moves toward completion, there will be


further refinement, as was anticipated when the project was approved and funded. Some items that GCA originally proposed may need to go into a future ANP project or be pursued by collaboration between APS and GCA. More information will be provided about the scope of the project as the plan is finalized.

IPC, the invasive control contractor hired by Arlington County, will complete the next treatment this fall and the final treatment next summer. Signs will be posted when the treatments take place and the area being treated will be safe to enter.

Wetland Studies and Solutions, a consulting firm hired by the county, has completed a tree survey. The plan is to evaluate existing trees for removal, pruning or retention once the invasive treatments are complete.

We hope you enjoy the new interactive activity in our community garden and learn something new along the way.


