County Manager Schwartz Addresses Community Concerns

On April 8, County Manager Mark Schwartz joined Glencarlyn residents in Carlin Hall.

First he made some brief remarks about the top issues on his mind:

Commercial office space vacancy rate is high, reducing County revenue. Schwartz has had to identify \$10M in budget cuts this year.

Afterschool programs are high priority, especially for those concerned about use of fentanyl and other drugs by Arlington youth.

Basic services are high priority and he tries to keep them intact.

Then Schwartz took questions and discussed issues important to the audience:

Arlington's first gun buyback program will be held this summer.

Long Branch Nature Center needs renovation, and residents would like more

open hours. It may be affected by changes to the 601 S. Carlin Springs Rd. property.

Schwartz stated that the County has no plan to reduce hours and "no intent to diminish **Glencarlyn Library**, full stop." The County sees sharing a library manager as a "reasonable solution," but Schwartz urged residents to speak up if we notice problems with library service.

Can the county offer **more summer camps**? It's difficult—they are "not money-makers," but the main limitation is space.

Traffic safety continues to be a high priority, but the County is "still figuring out" what changes will be feasible and effective.

Schwartz had no news on the **601 S. Carlin Springs Rd.** property.

Paying Your Dues

Are you paying your dues to Glencarlyn? I am not talking about serving as a GCA officer or volunteering at an event. Simply—are you paying your annual \$15 dues to the Glencarlyn Civic Association?

I often write about the importance of getting involved and contributing to our community. **The simplest and easiest** way to support your GCA is to pay your \$15 annual dues.

We make it **really** easy for you. There is a form, a link and instructions on the inside back page of every Village View. There is a QR code. We will be collecting dues at the Family Movie Night May 4th, and at the BBQ and Pancake breakfast during Glencarlyn Days May 31 and June 1st. I will even come to your house and pick them up!

GCA only has two "fundraisers" per year. We collect a nominal fee for the two meals over Glencarlyn Days weekend and we sell the luminaria kits at the holidays. Every other event and activity is free- sponsored by your civic association. In addition to the Glencarlyn Days activities, and luminaria and Holiday Party, we have a family event in the Spring and the Fall, and often more. GCA sponsors the annual Stream Cleanup and Community Yard Sale. Every household receives the monthly Village View newsletter 9 times a year. We provide a printed neighborhood directory. We present welcome packets to ALL our new neighbors. Everyone is greeted and welcome in Glencarlyn- renters and owners. Everyone residing in Glencarlyn is encouraged to be a part of the Glencarlyn Civic Association.

You see why your dues payments are so very important. They are the fuel that keeps our motor running. Yet, less than one third or our community families pay their annual dues.

"Back in the day"- I was around then- in addition to delivering the Village View each month, Block Captains knocked on doors and collected dues from their block members. It was effective- almost everyone paid their dues.

Now we have easier ways to pay, and more options, so block captains are no longer asked to collect dues. However, without collecting door to door, our percentage of dues payers has dropped considerably. And costs are rising. We know that food prices and the cost of paper products are up. Therefore, the costs to hold our events are also up. Our loyal advertisers support the cost of our Village View. Yet printing prices continue to skyrocket and their support is not enough. **We need everyone to pay their dues**.

We all feel the pinch of higher prices. Yet, surely each of us can find \$15 to donate to GCA. That breaks down to \$1.25 a month. Your community gains so much when we all are willing to give. Go to the back of your Village View, go to the website, PLEASE PAY YOUR DUES NOW! And if you want, you can make an additional donation to support our activities. KEEP OUR MOTOR RUNNING! THANK YOU!

Arlington Neighborhoods Program (ANP) Update

Construction on Kenmore Wooded Area Project Scheduled for Early Summer

This project will improve the wooded area at the west end of the Kenmore Middle School property, as well as the S. Manchester St. entrance and frontage, the 2nd St. S. dead end, and the east side of S. Manchester St. Ryan Donlon, Glencarlyn resident whose home is adjacent to the project area, is the block representative.

The 100% design for the project is scheduled for final approval in April. Procurement is expected to begin in the spring and construction in early summer of 2024. The county will obtain temporary easements for school and private property that will be affected by construction.

After plantings are established, neighborhood volunteers will be responsible for maintenance and cleanup of the project area and several neighbors have already offered to do this. Neighbors have also volunteered to empty the trash receptacle that will be placed near the area. Arlington Public Schools (APS) will review the approved design and provide guidance on neighborhood access to the APS property that is included in the project area. Discussions are underway about signage for the area and possible use by nearby school communities.

IPC, the invasive control contractor hired by Arlington County, will complete the yearly fall and spring treatments in spring, 2025. Signs will be posted when the treatment takes place and the area being treated will be safe to enter.

Wetland Studies and Solutions, a consulting firm hired by the county, has completed a tree survey. The plan is to evaluate existing trees for removal, pruning or retention once the invasive treatments are complete.

Doggie Corner



View from the Garden

Plant This Not That: Spanish Bluebells

I got some bad news recently. I picked up a new edition of "Plant Invaders of Mid-Atlantic Natural Areas" and found that one of my favorite bulbs, *Hyacinthoides hispanica*, or Spanish Bluebells, is a new entry, its invasive qualities manifesting in my area.

This pretty flower has sentimental meaning for me because I was first given bulbs of it by my now deceased Mother, dug from her beautiful garden. I liked it so much that 15 years ago, after spending a year and a half removing invasive English Ivy from my shady back yard, I bought a bag of 50 of

the bluest variety I could find, and carefully planted them throughout. A friend who knew I liked them gave me another 25 or so white ones. Over the years, I've watched what started as 75 individual bulbs mature into large clumps, making a beautiful show every spring. I've even recommended them to other people, compounding my guilt.

It's a hard way to personally learn a truth I've stated before but now am painfully living: the only way to guarantee you aren't planting future invasives is to plant natives. By definition (specifically Executive Order 13112 signed in 1999 by President Clinton), invasives are organisms that (1) are not native to the area in which they are being found, (2) are capable of escaping cultivation, and (3) can out-compete native organisms causing harm to human health, the economy or the environment. Invasive plants too often become a problem because we humans fall for the attractive qualities of a non-native plant and use it extensively, providing an expanding pool from which it reproduces itself.

I am relearning the lesson that only natives cannot become invasive over time each time I push my hori-hori knife into the ground, hoping to get deep enough to remove the round, white bulbs that have proliferated. While this is a giant task, it is made worse because I know that, try as I might, I will not find all the bulbs, and I will certainly have to come back and retry next spring, and maybe for many springs to come.

One comfort that I cling to is the fact that I will have a lot more room to plant some of the native plants that I have learned to love. Here are three that I'll be planting more of:

Virginia Bluebells (*Mertensia virginica*) are the obvious replacement for Spanish Bluebells. I've long believed their blue is one of the most beautiful colors nature provides. They are a spring ephemeral, with foliage dying to the ground by summer.

They look great with ferns which will quickly grow to cover the Bluebells' dying foliage. Virginia Bluebells support a variety of bees, butterflies and hummingbirds. One tip is that if you are planting on a slope, plant them at the top of the slope and they will gradually drop their seeds downhill, forming a beautiful carpet.

Another one of Northern Virginia's most stunning ephemerals is the Great White Trillium (*Trillium grandiflorum*). These threepetaled flowers spread very slowly if undisturbed. They start their bloom bright white and fade to a lovely pink as they age. One of the most delightful nearby nature walks is the "Trillium

Trail" section of the

Appalachian Trail with miles of Trilliums and other native spring ephemerals at the end of April and beginning of May each year.

Another plant I'll be adding more of is Foamflower (*Tiarella cordifolia*). The lacy spikes of white flowers that bloom from April to July are the source of their name, but their pretty leaves with deep red along the veins make them attractive throughout the

growing season. The leaves may turn a red-bronze color in autumn and sometimes remain evergreen in mild winters.

While my feelings about having planted a sentimental favorite that is now identified as a problem are complex, my feelings about being able to plant more favorite natives is pure joy.


