Dave Cahill, Glencarlyn resident and general manager of Ireland's Four Courts pub, provided the food. Dave also oversaw the dedicated volunteers grilling, preparing, and serving meals. The supper was held on the open grounds of Carlin Hall under pleasant skies. Matt Burridge provided gentle music as the buzz of conversation swirled around the tables. Kids enjoyed the many games and obstacle courses set up on 4th St. S., sponsored by our Glencarlyn Library. They played in the giant moon bounce and won goodies in the musical cakes game. The 50/50 raffle was back by popular demand, with proceeds split between the GCA, for activities and programs, and Mike Macrina, who held the winning ticket. The large turnout of younger families with children shows that many families in the neighborhood want to be involved in our community. GCA Vice President Courtney Holmes deserves the credit for organizing such an amazing event!

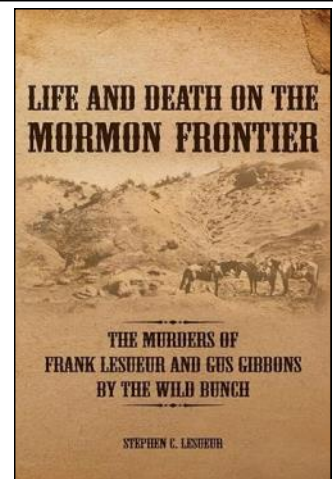
Glencarlyn Library and GCA Present *Life and Death on the Mormon Frontier* with Historian and Author Steve LeSueur, Tuesday, June 18, 7- 8 p.m. in Glencarlyn Library

A brutal double murder committed by Butch Cassidy’s notorious Wild Bunch Gang is the focus of Glencarlynite Steve LeSueur’s new book, *Life and Death on the Mormon Frontier: The Murders of Frank LeSueur and Gus Gibbons by the Wild Bunch*.

As a descendant of one of the many victims of Butch Cassidy’s Wild Bunch, LeSueur thoroughly and compellingly recounts the murder and its devastating effect on the family. “Unlike romanticized versions of Western bandits, *Life and Death on the Mormon Frontier* portrays a

grittier, authentic Old West in a manner that draws the reader into another era,” says critic Gregory Prince.

If Wild West history or Butch Cassidy are your thing, plan now to be at the Glencarlyn Library on June 18 from 7–8pm, and learn more about the gang which terrorized banks and trains on the American Western frontier in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Arlington Neighborhoods Program (ANP) Update

Project Design Approved!

This project will improve the wooded area at the west end of the Kenmore Middle School property, as well as the S. Manchester St. entrance and frontage, the 2nd St. S. dead end, and the east side of S. Manchester Street. Ryan Donlon, Glencarlyn resident whose home is adjacent to the project area, is the block representative.

The 100% design for the project received final approval at the end of April. Procurement is expected to begin in the spring and construction in early summer of 2024. The county will obtain temporary easements for school and private property that will be affected by construction.

After plantings are established, neighborhood volunteers will be responsible for maintenance and cleanup of the project area and several neighbors have already offered to do this. Neighbors have also volunteered to empty the trash receptacle that will be placed near the area. Arlington Public Schools (APS) will review

the approved design and provide guidance on neighborhood access to the APS property that is included in the project area. Discussions are underway about signage for the area and possible use by nearby school communities.

IPC, the invasive control contractor hired by Arlington County, will complete the yearly fall and spring treatments in spring, 2025. Signs will be posted when the treatment takes place and the area being treated will be safe to enter.

Wetland Studies and Solutions, a consulting firm hired by the county, has completed a tree survey. The plan is to evaluate existing trees for removal, pruning or retention once the invasive treatments are complete.

Julie Lee steps aside this summer after serving as GCA President for eight years. At the Glencarlyn Days BBQ, the Glencarlyn Civic Association presented her with a very special and unique gift—a Morgan silver dollar pendant. This silver dollar is especially significant because it was minted in 1887, the year Glencarlyn was founded.

President elect Brandon Hemel gave remarks, edited and condensed below:

Julie's roots go deep within our community. Her grandmother was the first children's librarian at the Glencarlyn Library, and her mother is the longest resident. Julie and her husband Willes met at Wakefield High School, lived around the globe, but were eventually pulled back to the greatest neighborhood in the world.

Julie was thrust into the presidency with the unfortunate and sudden passing of David Backus, and has been a steadfast champion of Glencarlyn from the moment she took office. She made it her duty to be the defender for our small but mighty community.

She has stood up for our neighborhood at county board meetings when they threatened to cut funding for our library (which is the oldest library in the system); fought to keep all of Glencarlyn in the same high school district; and, of course, fought for Glencarlyn during the Missing Middle debate. The county board, the civic federation, and the Arlington Police Department have recognized her accomplishments.

But that is just her advocacy work on our behalf. She is also great at getting our community together! Glencarlyn Days, Luminaria, the fall picnic, movie night, yard sales, the GCA directory, the Glencarlyn updates, and the Village view articles ... She works hard at organizing the fun stuff that brings us all together not just as neighbors, but as friends.

Glencarlyn is in good hands with us, and we will do our best to keep her legacy alive while she and Willes finally have some time to relax.

Fireflies, lightning bugs, or glowworms are all names of a set of small, flying creatures that appear and glow aimlessly throughout the sultry summer evenings. Neither worms nor flies nor even true “bugs,” these soft-bodied beetles remind us of running around in the dark as children trying to catch these elusive creatures. Lightning beetle species can glow a brilliant yellow, blue, and pale red. Fireflies (or lightning bugs, or whatever you call them) are a vital part of the health of the Arlington area. Come learn more about them at this annual event. The event will be canceled if it rains.

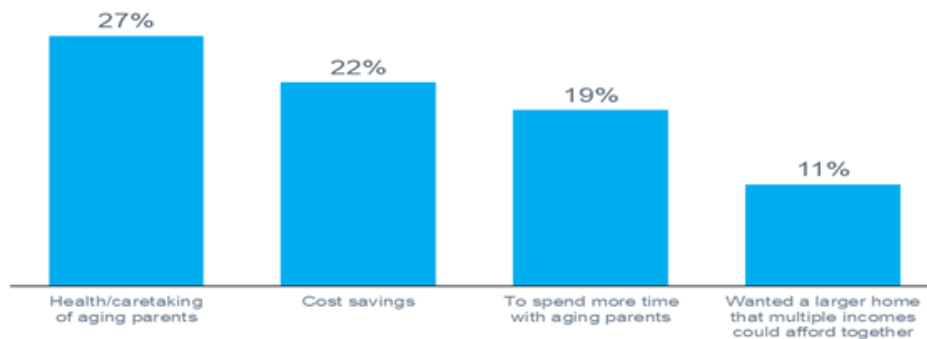
