



Arlington Neighborhoods Program (ANP) Update

Manchester St. and 2nd St. S. – Landscape owner's manual and educational signage text finalized

This funded project will improve the wooded area at the west end of the Kenmore Middle School property, as well as the S. Manchester St. entrance and frontage, the 2nd St. S. dead end, and the east side of S. Manchester St. Ryan Donlon, whose home is adjacent to the project area, is the block representative.

Construction is estimated to begin in early 2025 but a clear construction timeline is not yet available. The procurement package is being prepared, to be followed by the advertising process. All property easements have been acquired, including those for Arlington Public Schools property.

County staff finalized a landscape owner's manual for the 2nd St S & S Manchester pollinator garden. It will provide volunteers and interested residents with general and seasonal specific maintenance, including guidelines and facts for each plant. Staff finalized the text for the garden's educational signage. They will also launch a website once the educational signage is installed. This website will provide garden and maintenance information, including translations, via a QR code on the signage.

IPC, the invasive control contractor hired by Arlington County, will continue the yearly fall and spring treatments in spring, 2025. Wetland Studies and Solutions, a consulting firm hired by the county, has completed a tree survey. They will evaluate trees for removal, pruning or retention once the invasive treatments are complete.

Neighborhood Signs Maintenance and Relocation – Installation timing yet to be determined

For Glencarlyn, this project will replace the existing neighborhood signs at Arlington Blvd./S. Carlin Springs Rd., and at 5th Rd. S./ S. Carlin Springs Rd. The design will remain the same. The sign located at S. Manchester St./ Arlington Blvd. will be replaced and relocated.

Manufacturing of the replacement and relocated signage is underway. Weather conditions have delayed a final schedule for installation of the two replacement signs. Timing for installing the relocated sign is still to be determined.

Moses Ball Spring Area Restoration and Ecological Improvement – watch the video!

At the February GCA meeting, Kathy Reeder presented an overview of the GCA's proposed ANP project to restore the Moses Ball Spring area, located at 601 S. Carlin Springs Rd. The

project will consider the spring's historical and cultural significance and the need for ecological improvement. A working group of neighborhood residents is being formed to meet with the ANP planner to help scope the project. Moses Ball Spring Area Restoration and Ecological Improvement – working group being formed

This project proposes to restore the Moses Ball Spring area,

located at 601 S. Carlin Springs Rd. The project will consider the spring's historical and cultural significance and the need for ecological improvement. Kathy Reeder met with ANP staff to review the presentation given at the February GCA meeting. ANP staff will reach out to several county departments who may play a role in the project

and anticipates providing feedback by the end of March or early April 2025. Neighborhood residents Steve Young, Sue Campbell, Tim Aiken, Sue Auerbach and Kathy Reeder have volunteered for a working group to meet with the ANP planner to help scope the project once the feedback is available.

Arlington's Vision Zero and S. Carlin Springs Road

Arlington County's Quest for Safer Streets: Vision Zero in Focus Arlington County has ramped up its commitment to road safety through its Vision Zero initiative, a program dedicated to eradicating traffic-related fatalities and severe injuries by 2030. At the GCA meeting on March 3, Christine Baker, Program Zero Manager, delved into the plan's roots, objectives, and ongoing efforts. Among the strategies discussed were critical crash reviews, hotspot mitigation programs, and community-driven safety reporting, all underpinned by an equity-first approach. They also highlighted recent enhancements in the Glencarlyn area, such as newly marked crosswalks, curb extensions, and improved sidewalks on S. Carlin Springs Road. The county continues to track its progress meticulously with updated dashboards, while an action plan revision looms on the horizon.

Experimenting with Road Design: Lessons Learned In 2021, a pilot project aimed to reclaim a roadway lane as pedestrian space, offering a bold, albeit short-lived, experiment. Conducted during a lull in traffic activity, the county analyzed its impact on flow. However, the unpredictable driver behavior it prompted led to the project's discontinuation. Lessons learned have informed other efforts, including extending school zones along entire corridors and installing safety-focused measures like cameras and pedestrian-friendly signal timing.

Tackling School Traffic and Community Safety The meeting also explored school-related traffic dynamics, focusing

on student commuting patterns and the challenges posed by increased traffic cutting through neighborhoods. The conversation touched on the complexity of beacon lighting policies and the potential—but expensive—installation of radar speed signs like the one on N. Carlin Springs Road.

Of the 19 school zone traffic cameras installed in Arlington, S. Carlin Springs Road is the only road with two in place. And of the nearly 7,000 citations issued, nearly 50% were from those two cameras.

Upcoming Challenges Suggestions to lower speed limits, improve crosswalks, and add better signage were met with discussions on infrastructure's long-term effectiveness. Traffic backups and erratic driving remain challenges, prompting officials to encourage residents to report issues through county systems. Notably, some intersections, such as those near Columbia Pike, fall under neighboring Fairfax County's jurisdiction, adding layers of complexity to coordinated efforts.

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
Doggie Corner



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View from the Garden

A Brief History Of the Easter Lily By Extension Master Gardener Paul Nuhn

The Easter Lily (Lilium longiflorum), a staple in Christian Easter services, has a fascinating history with multiple "discoveries" over a century.

Englishman Carl Peter Thunberg first discovered the lily during his travels in the Far East in early 1800s. The British cultivated the bulb and sold them throughout the Isles. The second and third discoveries were by American servicemen in 1880s and in again in 1917 while touring Ryukyu Islands of Japan.

Seeking better growing conditions, the English sent the bulbs to Bermuda where American (Russell Hastings) had recently moved around 1880s due to health issues resulting from his wounds during the Civil War.

Hastings was a Second Lieutenant in the Ohio Volunteers and was severely wounded in the Battle of Winchester (1862). This injury forced the General Hastings (with multiple promotions by wars end) to seek warmer climates. He and his wife Emily spent

a winter in Bermuda and decided to move permanently there in 1879 buying a 50-acre homestead.

Having seen the lilies growing on farms there he started a business venture with a New York florist importing them to America and Europe. This sparked the first wave of interest in the states. Bermuda eventually shipped nearly 300,000 bulbs yearly to England, Holland, and America until a virus wiped out the crop killing the bulb industry.



The third discoverer Louis Houghton stationed in Japan in 1917 brought bulbs home with him to the Pacific Northwest where farms started growing bulbs in mass to sell to wholesalers nationwide. However, the growing conditions meant producers needed to harvest bulbs at the correct bloom time for the various regions of America. With Japan still importing the lily bulbs into America, the exposure of this beautiful flower to a wider audience soon followed.

Enter WW2. All imports coming from the Japan stopped, stopping the bulb market. After WW2 producers started expanding the business and the bulb industry took off. Within a decade over 1,000 bulb farms were growing lilies. After a period of consolidation, the bulb industry is now controlled by a dozen growers with over 90% off all Easter lilies sold in the US coming from the Pacific Northwest. Over 11 million bulbs are sold each vear in the US.

Beyond the historical connections the lily has been associated with Easter Sunday and mistakenly associated with the Bible. The lily mentioned in the Bible is the Madonna Lily (Lilium) candidum) found native from the Balkans to Middle East and is found locally in the regions mentioned in the Bible. This bulb has now been naturalized in southern Europe, North Africa, and Mexico.

Through the Middle Ages this was the flower closely associated with the Virgin Mary and found in art of the last 1500 years. The reason this lily is not used during Easter functions is that is difficult to grow and hard to force into bloom to coincide with the Easter Holiday.
