














Invasive Spotted Lanternfly in Glencarlyn

They're here, boo! The dreaded Spotted Lanternfly invasive insect pest has arrived in Glencarlyn. Technically a leafhopper, not a fly, these pests can hop and fly, and they suck the juices of many plants, both garden plants and natural forest plants. That's right, they suck. Their feeding, and a mold they spread, damage the plants. They are especially fond of the invasive Ailanthus tree, Tree-of-Heaven. Arlingtonians are encouraged to remove Ailanthus using professionals who know how to kill it without resprouting. Young lanternflies are small, black, with white spots. The adults also have bright red wings, as well as spots. If

you encounter them, try to kill them. Stomp or squish them if you can, or spray them with white vinegar (avoiding tender green vegetation). Much more information can be found at tinyurl.com/slfo625

Our Barred Owl Neighborhood Friend

A hooty Barred Owl has befriended the Glencarlynites who live in the South Harrison Street cul-de-sac off South 5th Street, an area sometimes affectionately known as Harrison Street Hollow. The owl—he, she, or sometimes they—can often be seen perched high in a towering Carolina longleaf pine that stands about 100 feet tall at the east end of the cul-de-sac.

J. Vic Funderburk planted the tree 48 years ago after digging up the sapling from the front yard of his childhood home in Cheraw,

South Carolina. He had originally planted the "mother" longleaf pine there as part of a Boy Scout restoration project more than 71 years ago.

The baby pine that he brought to Arlington, once no thicker than a pencil, is now a robust tree with a trunk nearly two feet in diameter. Its many widespread branches provide a mostly hidden, peaceful resting place for our beloved owls.

Almost every afternoon between 4 and 5 p.m. we are treated to their calls. They can be quite loud and if there is more than one in the vicinity, they can make a cacophony of over lapping sounds which are captivating! Go to tinyurl.com/barredo625a to listen to various Barred Owl calls.

Come see, and hopefully hear, for yourself! Walk down 5th street and turn right onto Harrison. Where the cul-de-sac divides walk to the left and circle down on the sidewalk. When you are near

the bottom of the circle, somewhere between 527 and 531, look up into the large thick-trunked pine. The owl or owls are usually secluded somewhere in the top third of its tall branches. They are quite well camouflaged, feathers and coloring merged with long leaf pine needles. Sometimes it is nearly impossible to see them, but when you do it is such a treat.

The natural world around us provides so many gifts. Besides trees and owls, we Funderburks feel grateful to have found the gift of Glencarlyn 49 years ago. Tucked away from two busy roadways, surrounded on three sides by woods, it has a very long history of being a "neighborhood". Gatherings throughout the year remind us of how lucky we are. Pancake Breakfast in the park, Glencarlyn Day parade with children and wagons and bikes dressed in

the theme of the year, semi-regular Bar-B-Que suppers at Carlin Hall with ice cream bars for treats. Master Gardeners organize a Spring Celebration every year, a day-long festival selling plants propagated from the Library Garden. They also provide weekly upkeep of the teaching gardens behind the Library and along the parking lot. Memorial benches become places for sitting while the beautiful plantings fill your eyes and heart.

Speaking of filling one's eyes and heart, there are those very special Barred Owls who announce almost every day the joy of sharing our stories and speaking truth: "Hoo, Hooty, Who! Who hoots for You!" How blessed we are in our neighborhood and with our nature friends who bring us their songs.

Celebrating Lifelong Glencarlyn Resident Mary Benn

Mary Florance Benn passed away peacefully on May 4, 2025 after a long and vibrant life marked by devotion to family, service to her community, and a deep appreciation for the arts and new experiences.

Mary Florance and her family moved to Glencarlyn in 1943, when Carlin Hall was the one room school house; small farms still existed in the community; and several roads were unpaved. Mary had an idyllic childhood growing up in Glencarlyn. She was a girl scout in the neighborhood troop, remaining lifelong friends with two members, and she enjoyed playing tennis on the Backus tennis courts on 5th Street. She shared fond

memories of the childhood mischief she and her friends had made. Mary worked as the first page at Glencarlyn Library and graduated from Washington-Lee High School.

She married John Benn Jr., whose family lived in the Burdett house on 3rd Street, and they built their own house on the same block after they wed. Raising her three children in that home, Mary remained there until her death at the age of 92. Mary resided in Glencarlyn for 82 years; few have lived here longer.

A woman of unwavering faith and fierce independence, Mary volunteered in her church and community, serving as a Friend of the Kennedy Center for 30 years. Mary was known for her inquisitive spirit and courageous heart. Above

VHC Health Wellness Hospital-601 Carlin Springs Road Update

As of mid-June 2025, VHC Health and their partner LifePoint Health have not submitted a 4.1 site plan request to Arlington County.

The latest wrinkle in the plan is that the county is now changing the terms. Instead of selling 5.5 acres of the property to VHC Health, they are offering a long-term 75-year land lease, with an option to extend for another 24 years.

From Adrian Stanton, Vice President, Real Estate Acquisition & Development, VHC Health:

"From the perspective of the overall site plan, there isn't much change. We still will be building the facility on the same part of the parcel as originally planned. We also are still planning on a 2-story structure, of the same size, with parking under the facility. We're still in the draft phase of the land lease with the County, but the current structure would be a 75-year land lease with an option to extend it an additional 24 years."

In Memoriam: Steve LeSueur

We are deeply saddened to report that long-time Glencarlyn resident Steve LeSueur passed away peacefully at his home July 1, after a two-year battle with cancer. He was 73 years old.

Steve played a key role in our recent efforts to support the Glencarlyn Library, conceptualizing and organizing the library's monthly Speakers Series.

Steve was also an acclaimed author himself and spoke at one of last year's speaker sessions on his book, *Life and*

Death on the Mormon Frontier. The book tells the story of the murder of Steve's great uncle, Frank LeSueur, by members of the Wild Bunch gang of outlaws in the 1900s.

Most recently, Steve published *Every Man a Prophet*, a comingof-age novel about two young Mormon missionaries. The book explores their struggles with the complexities of identity, faith and the universal need to belong.

Glencarlyn resident Simon De Groot, who worked with Steve on the library's Speakers Series, commented, "I feel very blessed to have known Steve as a neighbor and friend. He was a very smart, talented guy with a great sense of humor who was just fun to spend time with. It was a pleasure in recent years to get to know him a little better through the Glencarlyn Book Club and our involvement in the library support group. We will all miss Steve but can be very grateful for his presence in the Glencarlyn community."

Commented library associate Erika Ramos, "The time, care and energy Steve put into making our Speakers Program such a success meant so much to all of us at the Library. His generosity, vision and spirit have made a lasting impression."

Steve and his family came to Glencarlyn in March 1989. He is survived by his wife, Kathy Reeder, daughter Samantha, and son Danny.

Arlington Neighborhoods Program (ANP) Update

Manchester St. and 2nd St. S. – Construction estimated to begin this summer

This funded project will improve the wooded area at the west end of the Kenmore Middle School property, as well as the S. Manchester St. entrance and frontage, the 2nd St. S. dead end, and the east side of S. Manchester St. Ryan Donlon, whose home is adjacent to the project area, is the block representative.

Construction is estimated to begin this summer - July or August - but a clear construction timeline is not yet available. The procurement package is being prepared, to be followed by the advertising process. All property easements have been acquired.

County staff finalized a landscape owner's manual for the 2nd St S & S Manchester pollinator garden. It will provide volunteers and interested residents with general and seasonal specific maintenance, including guidelines and facts for each plant. Staff finalized the text for the garden's educational signage. They will also launch a website once the educational signage is installed. This website will provide garden and maintenance information, including translations, via a QR code on the signage.

IPC, the invasive control contractor hired by Arlington County, will continue the yearly fall and spring treatments in June 2025. Wetland Studies and Solutions, a consulting firm hired by the county, has completed a tree survey. They will evaluate trees for removal, pruning or retention once the invasive treatments are complete.

Neighborhood Signs Maintenance and Relocation – Installation timing still to be determined

For Glencarlyn, this project will replace the existing neighborhood signs at Arlington Blvd./S. Carlin Springs Rd., and

at 5th Rd. S./ S. Carlin Springs Rd. The design will remain the same. The sign located at S. Manchester St./ Arlington Blvd. will be replaced and relocated.

Manufacturing of the replacement and relocated signage is underway. Weather conditions have delayed a final schedule for installation of the two replacement signs. Timing for installing the relocated sign is still to be determined.

Moses Ball Spring Area Restoration and Ecological Improvement – ANP staff feedback anticipated soon

This project proposes restoring the Moses Ball Spring area,

located at 601 S. Carlin Springs Rd. The project will consider the spring's historical and cultural significance and the need for ecological improvement.

The neighborhood working group (Steve Young, Sue Campbell, Tim Aiken, Sue Auerbach and Kathy Reeder) is gathering information to better understand elements of the proposed project and determine neighborhood priorities. ANP staff is

requesting input from various county departments that may be involved with the project and anticipates meeting with the working group in early summer to share this information.



Long Branch Stream Outfall Repairs

At the May 2025 GCA meeting Lily Whitesell and Christin Conway from Arlington County's Department of Envormental Services presented draft plans to repair the stream outfall at the intersection of 5th Road South and South Kensington Street.

The stream outfall is on the edge of the 601 S. Carlin Springs Road Property and is hidden behind the fencing and overgrowth of trees and shrubs. However, the concrete pipe leading from 5th Road to the stream is extremely damaged by erosion. To make the repair, some of the vegetation and the fence at the intersection will be removed. The fence will be replaced and replanting of trees and shrubbery will take place.


school, and assist a loved one in reaching medical services. Bicycles in Africa provide many avenues of access that directly impact quality of life as well as empowering individuals to change their communities.
