President's Corner

The Dillon Rule and How It Affects Glencarlyn and Arlington County



Neighbors, one of the joys and burdens of being GCA President is learning the legislative and legal intricacies of the state of Virginia including how a nineteenth century ruling by the Iowa Supreme Court affects our county's government.

I cannot say that this was something I expected to sign up for, nor is it something that falls under my area of expertise. I am not a lawyer or a legal scholar.

However, in the past two years, I've learned about how The Dillon Rule has affected Virginia case law and defines how local jurisdictions are subject to state legislation.

This rule dates to an 1868 ruling by John Dillon, a justice on the Iowa Supreme Court who was concerned about local officials being corrupt and passing unethical laws or inappropriately giving businesses public funds. In his opinion, Dillon determined localities only really exist because of their state legislatures.

A Virginia court first cited the rule in 1882. About a decade later, the Virginia Supreme Court cited the Dillon Rule when it found the city of Winchester didn't have the authority to reward citizens for helping apprehend criminals. So, the Dillon Rule was repeatedly adopted over time through case law, not legislation or the state constitution. (ref: tinyurl.com/presapr26)

Why am I boring you, my fellow Glencarlynite with esoteric case law? Because, while other states have a Home Rule process, allowing municipalities to enact laws based on local need unless they've been told they cannot, we have the opposite in Virginia.

From the founding of Virginia as a colony to present day, power has flowed from the top down to local governments within our state.

Every time the General Assembly meets in Richmond, state legislators are asked by lobbyists, local officials, and interest groups to alter some restriction on local government.

Varied interpretations by the state courts on strict meanings of the Dillon Rule have been a factor in key judicial decisions. Because the Dillon Rule is a judicial philosophy used by the state courts in Virginia and is not based on a specific state law, legal clarifications vary on when it should be applied. In practice, this means that Arlington County cannot enact any laws or enforce any regulation unless they have been specifically given the power to do so by the Virginia legislature.

This is why Arlington County could not place speed cameras in the school zones along S. Carlin Springs Road until the state allowed them to do so.

And this is why I felt it was important to sign onto an effort to slow the enactment of legislation (Senate Bill 388) that would erode local zoning and local jurisdictional authority by allowing by-right construction of multi-unit housing on property owned by houses of worship and nonprofits.

While we often wish that Arlington County could move faster in enacting changes for betterment of its residents, we are sometimes stuck in murky waters navigating the Dillon Rule.

Update on the Sidewalk Construction and Street Light Replacement


During the past month, the contractor has worked on the retaining wall and sidewalk on the southern side of Carlin Springs at 6th Road S. The retaining wall is providing the expansion for the 6 foot sidewalk and the 2 foot buffer. The southeast corner will continue to have the curb extension to provide slower movements through the intersection.

NEW CONSTRUCTION:

As part of the S Carlin Springs Road Pedestrian Improvements, the county is anticipating a new phase of construction on the EAST side to start in early April if not started already. The sidewalk expansion will cover two blocks (see image below) -> on the north and south of our current construction work. The County is using on-call contractors to move faster on this work, and they have issued a Notice to Proceed (NTP). They are waiting for the contractor to receive construction materials that are in back order. As soon as the materials arrive, they will send out email notification providing you with information on the start of the new construction phase.

We have noticed students and adults going around the construction signs and walking on the travel lanes or through the construction zone – please use the crosswalks where the signs are located. There is no room within the construction zone to accommodate stray walkers.

Safety is the #1 priority. While we recognize it does take about 2-4 minutes longer to move through the construction zone, it keeps everyone safe. Please obey all posted detour and speed limit signs through the construction zone.

Arlington County Sheriff Outlines Reforms and Community Initiatives at Civic Meeting

At the March 2026 GCA meeting, Arlington County Sheriff Jose Quiros provided residents with an inside look at the priorities and initiatives guiding his office. Emphasizing transparency and community partnership, Quiros detailed the broad range of responsibilities his team undertakes, from managing the county jail and ensuring courthouse security to serving civil process documents. Currently, the county's jail houses 345 individuals, with an average stay of 146 days, many of whom grapple with complex challenges like mental health issues, substance abuse, and homelessness.

The sheriff clarified that only judges or magistrates can authorize an inmate's release. He explained the legal requirements for fingerprinting, which applies only to felony charges with all relevant data relayed to the FBI and state police. Quiros also distinguished between administrative and judicial warrants, noting that his office acts solely on the latter, and took time to dispel misunderstandings when deputies serve civil documents, which some residents mistake for immigration

enforcement.

A centerpiece of the Quiros approach is a commitment to rehabilitation and staff well-being. Partnerships with the police department's community engagement team and local organizations are fostering stronger ties with residents. Staff support has been enhanced through mentorship programs and workplace upgrades.

Highlighting innovation in inmate services, Quiros shared news of a doula program for pregnant women and the transition to in-house medical care. The Community Readiness Unit, a voluntary reentry program, connects inmates with job opportunities through local employers, supporting successful transitions back into society.

Mental health remains a significant focus, with dedicated facilities and wellness initiatives. Sheriff Quiros encouraged community involvement through volunteering, emphasizing that ongoing reform and engagement are key to building trust and fostering safe, supportive environments for all.

VHC Health Behavioral Center Update

Arlington County accepted VHC's application for the Wellness & Behavioral Health Facility (VHC WBHF) proposed for 601 Carlin Springs Road on February 23. This initiates the formal approval and review process which will include a public kick-off meeting, an online community engagement period, and a series of public hearings before advisory commissions leading up to a County Board hearing and vote. The date for a rescheduled VHC WBHF Kick-Off Meeting has yet to be released.

GCA will be continuing our active engagement with the County and VHC throughout the months-long process. The regular GCA meeting on Monday, April 6 will include a detailed review of the

VHC WBHF plans and documents. Please take advantage of this opportunity to learn about the project and share your initial comments with GCA leadership. We'll follow up that meeting with a neighborhood survey in mid-April. GCA's goal is to fully understand our neighbors' perspectives so that we can best represent Glencarlyn in this process.

Arlington Neighborhoods Program (ANP) Update

Manchester St. and 2nd St. S. – Preconstruction activities are beginning

This funded project will improve the wooded area at the west end of the Kenmore Middle School property, as well as the S. Manchester St. entrance and frontage, the 2nd St. S. dead end, and the east side of S. Manchester St. Ryan Donlon, whose home is adjacent to the project area, is the block representative.

Bids were returned in November and a contractor has been chosen and awarded the contract. Preconstruction activities are beginning and staff is awaiting a schedule from the contractor prior to preconstruction meetings. Construction is estimated for summer 2026. All property easements have been acquired.

County staff finalized a landscape owner's manual for the 2nd St S & S Manchester pollinator garden. It will provide volunteers and interested residents with general and seasonal specific maintenance, including guidelines and facts for each plant. Staff finalized the text for the garden's educational signage. They will also launch a website once the educational signage is installed. This website will provide garden and maintenance information, including translations, via a QR code on the signage.

IPC, the invasive control contractor hired by Arlington County, completed a fall treatment at the end of September 2025. The final treatment is scheduled for mid-July later this year. Wetland Studies and Solutions, a consulting firm hired by the county, has completed a tree survey. They will evaluate trees for removal, pruning or retention once the invasive treatments are complete.

Neighborhood Signs Replacement and Relocation – Permit awaiting approval

The old sign located at S. Manchester St./ Arlington Blvd. will be

replaced and relocated within the landscape triangle just south of the S. Manchester St. intersection as you head south into Glencarlyn. The new sign will use the same design as the old one and will be angled to face traffic heading south and located in front of the Crepe Myrtle within the triangle. The permit fee has been paid and the ANP planner is awaiting issuance of the approved permit/placard to provide to the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) for installation. The next step will be working with DPR to install the sign. Thanks again to resident Amanda Martin for coordinating this relocation!

The old neighborhood signs at Arlington Blvd./S. Carlin Springs Rd., and at 5th Rd. S./ S. Carlin Springs Rd have been replaced with new signs, using the same design.

S. Harrison St. Circle – Site for new ANP project

The oval on the S. Harrison St. circle was proposed in November 2025 as Glencarlyn's new first-priority ANP project. It will replace the Moses Ball Spring project (see the September Village View). This new project proposes to remove and replace deteriorating structures, replace invasive plants with natives, help resolve any stormwater management issues and treat the invasive ivy on the west side of S. Harrison St., beginning at 5th St. S. Pippy Sickbert, resident of S. Harrison St., will be the project's point of contact for residents and the county. She can be reached at kkravchonok@gmail.com. Mowing, weeding, planting volunteers needed – Spring will be here soon!

View from the Garden

A Few Ways to Begin Gardening with Native Plants this Spring

I don't know about you, but I am ready to see some color in my garden! As I write this the last of the snow is melting and I know spring is approaching, because the tips of daffodils and other spring bulbs are beginning to peek through the soil and the buds of trees are swelling and ready to burst with flowers. Now is a great time to start thinking about starting, or adding to, a new or existing garden bed that will provide structure, seasonal color, as well as habitat for wildlife while also attracting pollinators. Here are some easy ways to add native plants to your garden that will do just that. Most of these plants can be found throughout the Library garden.

Let's start with the tree layer. Most are familiar with the Eastern Redbud (*Cercis canadensis*), which grows best in full sun to part shade. This tree produces magnificent pink to magenta flowers clustered along the bare branches in early spring. These flowers provide an early-season nectar source for hummingbirds. Another favorite of mine is the Fringe Tree or Old Man's Beard (*Chionanthus virginicus*), which is a multi-stemmed small tree or large shrub and grows best in full to part sun. In spring, fragrant flower

clusters with creamy white fringe-like petals appear. It has showy blue-black fruits that mature in late summer which birds and wildlife enjoy. If you have the space, a larger tree such as an oak (*Quercus species*) is ideal for providing food and shelter for a variety of wildlife and insects.

Next, consider including a shrub layer that will provide berries as well as flowers. Two shrubs to consider are the Winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*) and the Red Chokeberry (*Aronia arbutifolia*). Both shrubs produce clusters of white to pink flowers in spring followed by showy berries in fall through winter, although only female winterberries produce berries (note for winterberry shrubs: at least one male plant is needed for female plants to produce berries). Both shrubs can be planted in full sun to part shade (however, best flowering and berry production is with full sun). The chokeberry shrubs have the added benefit of excellent

fall color.

For a full season of flowers in a sunny spot, consider planting a mix of black-eyed Susans (*Rudbeckia fulgida*), beardtongue (*Penstemon digitalis*), blazing star (*Liatris spicata*), whorled tickseed (*Coreopsis verticillata*), aromatic asters (*Symphyotrichum oblongifolium* 'October Skies'), and goldenrods such as 'Fireworks' wrinkleleaf goldenrod (*Solidago rugosa* 'Fireworks').

For shadier gardens try adding texture and flowers with any combination of Christmas ferns (*Polystichum acrostichoides*), foamflower (*Tiarella cordifolia*), seersucker sedge (*Carex plantaginea*), Jacob's ladder (*Polemonium reptans*), columbine (*Aquilegia canadensis*), dwarf crested iris (*Iris cristata*), and shade loving asters and solidagos like blue wood aster (*Symphyotrichum cordifolium*) and blue-stemmed goldenrod (*Solidago caesia*).

When choosing your plants remember, the more the merrier! Plant in odd numbers and add as many as your budget will allow. If you want a more formal look, plant similar flowers together and for a looser effect, mix them up. Don't forget that containers in the garden or on your patio, deck, or balcony can be a simple, easy way to add flowers. All the perennials listed for both sun and shade above should be happy in containers in similar light conditions. Either way, you will make a lot of pollinators, insects, and wildlife very happy as soon as flowering gets underway.
